### In Memoriam

#### MALCOLM MACPHERSON

There passed away peacefully after a short illness, at the home of his sister, Mrs. Sewell, Cambridge, Mass., on December 11th, Mr. Malcolm MacPherson, son of the late Norman and Susan MacPherson, Forest Hill, in the 46th year of his age.

Mr. Campbell was an industries and thrifty citizen, and was strong in his convictions. He was a member of the Church of Scotland. The hospitality of the home of Mr. and Mrs. Campbell will long be remembered by all who visited them.

The funeral took place on Saturday the 12th, at the cemetery at Millville. The services at the house and grave were conducted by his pastor, Rev. Ewen MacDougall. The pallbearers were: B. Mitchell, Robt. McNaught, J. B. Crozier, Wm. Boulter, M. Lockhart, and Richard Wood.

#### BENJAMIN L. CAMPBELL

Benjamin L. Campbell, a highly respected resident of Lot 8, died there on January 3, 1929. He had sustained the testing affliction of disease for an extended period, and when hope of recovery had vanished, he resigned his will to the infinite Creator. He was buried in Mount Royal Cemetery, with all the respect and sympathy that had been merited by a well-spent life. He was born in Malpeque and his wife was Miss Silliker. He was a farmer by profession and kept abreast of the times. He was a strong and influential Conservative always taking a keen interest in every movement that promoted the interests of the party. Matthews, Elmdale, Mrs. Murdoch MacPherson, Regina, Sask.; his wife, who was in maidenhood, Dorothy Lillian Silliker, predeceased him seven years ago. His two daughters, Elizabeth, Mrs. Harry Dugan, and Maud are deceased. Mr. Campbell was a fine specimen of manhood and was a staunch supporter of any cause that appealed to him as worthy of encouragement. He was, in an election a candidate supporting the Conservative cause, and here he displayed sound, common sense, and remarkable ability. He was also a practical supporter of school and church, and in these interests he displayed a strength that was keenly felt.

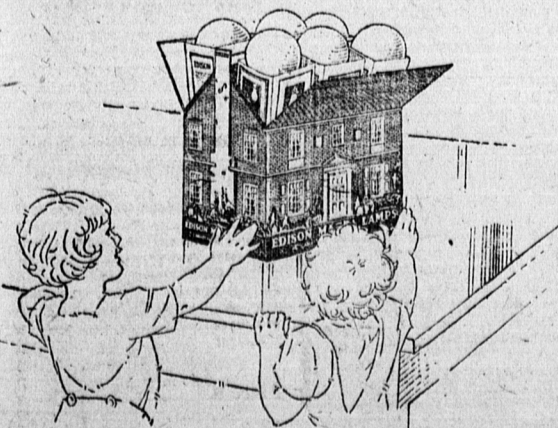
