STARS TAKE ROVERS INTO CAMP, SCORE, 9-3

"Lefty" McQuaid, "Star" hurler of the Eastern clan and champions of the first section of City League baseball breezed through last evening at the Abegweit Grounds, winning from the Rovers by a score of 9 to 3.

Last evening's set-to was the final of the first section, and although the issue ended in a one-sided score, the excitement nevertheless was intense and thoroughly enjoyed by upwards of eight hundred ball followers.

The Rovers, led by "Whacker" McEachern both on the defense and offence played heads-up ball all the way, but McQuaid's portly hurler of the Eastern contingent was on, with the result that the former nine failed to hit and lost a popular verdict—even with nothing at stake.

Your Connors on the loggers' mound worked hard in every inning of the game, he failed to stop the consistent hitting of his opponents, led by a recruit of this year, "Pump" Bulger by name who batted for 750 and then some—he was thrown out on his last close attempt to reach the starting point—first base. Nevertheless the plucky Rover slab-man stuck to the work in hand, and if he didn't come through with a win, he creditably sustained the great prestige already achieved in City League baseball.

The first section is over, the Stars playing true to form won the first half, and that by a considerable margin, with the Anchors and Rovers finishing together in second position.

The attendances have been wonderful, far beyond the most sanguine dreams of those closely in touch with ball doings, and the ball players and officials alike are most grateful. The second section of the league begins on Friday, July 2nd when the Anchors and Rovers meet. The initial game of this half should draw big, even a far greater attendance than has so far graced the stand and bleachers of the Abegweit Grounds.

In passing it may be mentioned that the previous half that has been passed during the games has not been patronized as much as the officials would like; therefore let's hope that the thousands who attend the games throughout the last section series respond, and give more generously—even if it be one cent.

The writer in conversation with one of the collectors was informed that it was, with very few exceptions, the same fans who contributed at each game; others attend but never come through—no dime!

RAGGING THE UMPIRE

In one or two games of the recent series Umpire McAleer, officially chosen, has been the butt of no little abuse and ragging, the result of close and impartial decision; some of the fans too have resorted to loud-mouthed criticisms, especially in close contests. It is only human nature to support your favorite team and support it strongly, but there is a limit to it, especially in the case of amateur ball—in the lower provinces.

To question the judgment of an umpire is a loud-mouthed exception is absolutely out of order, as far as Jack McAleer is concerned. He knows the game, or he would not be there; and furthermore when he gives a decision the writer has every reason to believe that Mac would not call "em unless he thought he was doing his duty.

Let's hope that less ragging and more co-operation with the umpire will be manifested in the next section which commences, as above mentioned on Friday next July 2nd.

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

U. S. Stars Lead For British Open

ST. ANNES, England, June 25.—The band of links stars from the United States swept impressively on toward the British open golf crown in the second day's play today, with youthful Bobby Jones, of Atlanta, Ga., and wild Bill Johnston, of Chicago, passing Walter Hagen to jointly lead the procession with scores of 144. Hagen took a 77 today to fall one stroke behind. Three other transatlantic stars followed closely behind with Archie Compton and Sam Barber, the first British players on the list, six strokes back of the leading pair.

Al Watrous and Freddy McLeod came through with a pair of 76's today to clinch fourth place while George von Elm and the Los Angeles amateur, bettered his opening day card of 75 by three strokes to finish sixth at 147. Compton came through with a 74 to bring Great Britain a ray of hope, but his total of 150 for the thirty-six holes finished him tied for seventh place with two United States players, Cyril Walker and Tommy Armour.

Sixty-four of the original 117 starters were eliminated from the test today. Fifty-three thus remain for the long two eighteen hole rounds tomorrow with championship to go to the low scorer for the total 72 hole play.

Suzanne Beaten In The Doubles

WIMBLEDON, Eng., June 25.—The Wimbledon doubles champion carried the French colors to defeat with Mile, Didi Vlasto in the jubilee tennis tournament today before the spectacular team work at the net and the slicing attack of Miss Elizabeth Ryan and Miss Mary K. Browne, the United States team.

More than 17,000 spectators among them the Duke and Duchess of York, applauded the bitterly contested match, replete with magnificent tennis. The score in this thrilling three-set doubles, which eliminated Mile, Lenglen and her partner in the first round was 3-6, 7-6, 6-2. It was this match that the French champion refused to play yesterday.
