Monthly Meeting Protestant Orphanage

The first meeting of the Trustees of the Protestant Orphanage in the New Year was held on Tuesday January 22nd. There was an excellent attendance of out-of-town members from as far west as Ellerslie and Summerside and East to Montague.

The meeting was presided over by the Chairman of the Board, Mr. W. A. Stewart, City.

Minutes of the last meeting were read and adopted and the following additions to the Endowment Fund received since last meeting were announced: Estate L. E. Brecker \$1,118.28; \$500.00 Accumulation Estate H. R. Hillson and Estate Janie Patridge \$188.43.

The chief attraction of the meeting was receiving reports of the year 1945 and not the least was the finances.

Mrs. H. S. Henderson in presenting this report stated that it was her nineteenth consecutive effort and that this year crowned them in one amount collected and even though the expenses were higher there still was a comfortable surplus over all. Full details were given and the general expenditure. Many new districts had been induced to make collections and the steady ones in most cases showed increases. Her work as chairman of the Finances, keeping the books so many sections and collectors had been heavy but the rewards were many.

A vote of thanks was moved and all supported in presenting his appreciation. Mrs. Henderson thanked them for the vote and expressed her fine co-operation throughout.

The report of the Adoption Committee was brief and showed that nineteen children had been admitted during the year and the same number placed in homes.

The Home Committee was interesting and reported that many societies and individuals had helped greatly to make things pleasant for the children. One particularly touching episode was the visit of an army officer now living in Toronto. When he arrived at the Orphanage he presented the McTron with the words that he felt to come home for he had been a child in the institution and could never forget how well he had been treated by all.

The School Committee reported that the teacher had resigned and another would have to be engaged at once.

The passing of bills for payment concluded the business and the members lingered discussing the many phases of a most successful year and the pleasure all workers and friends would get from the knowledge that under their unbeatable financial leader their combined efforts had made success possible and the children would reap the benefit.

Find Mussolini Was Healthy Man

WASHINGTON, Jan. 23 (AP) - Studies of the body of Benito Mussolini have disclosed that he was an "unusually healthy" man at the time of his execution, army pathologists reported today.

The studies also show that snipers took several pot-shots at the body of Il Duce either before or after it was hung by the feet in a public place in Milan.

Scientists of the Army Institute of Pathology drew these conclusions after examining a report of an autopsy performed on the fallen dictator's body by Italian doctors.

The autopsy report was made by Prof. Mario Cattabeni and Prof. Enea Scola of the University of Catania and by Prof. Emanuel D'Abundo of the University of Milan.

The only abnormal thing reported was the presence of a small adhesion linking part of the small intestine with the neck of the gall bladder.

"This might possibly indicate gall-bladder trouble," said Col. Ash, "but if such an ailment existed, it must have been slight."

AIR SEA RESCUE SERVICE

LONDON (CP) - During the European war the Air Sea rescue service saved 5,721 aircrew personnel in waters around the United Kingdom, civilians in areas other than the seas around Britain.

IN MEMORIAM

MRS. NEEL MacKENNON

On December 28th, there passed peacefully away at the home of his wife, Mrs. M. MacKinnon, of Foxe Hill, Neil MacKinnon, who advanced age of one hundred and one years.

The late Mr. MacKinnon was one of Canada's oldest twins, the other twin Donald, who resided in Nova Scotia, predeceased him several months ago. So unusual are Centennial twins and so widely was it known that they existed, that the nephew was the recipient of many letters from both Canada and the United States asking for sketches of their past histories.

Mr. MacKinnon who always enjoyed good health was until a year ago able to move about among his friends and enjoy his daily walks. Throughout the last year he gradually lost his strength and in the latter part of his life he was tenderly nursed and cared for by his nephew and Mrs. MacKinnon.

The funeral was held on December 28th and despite the inclement weather, many gathered to pay their last respects to the departed. The service was conducted by Rev. M. D. MacLeod of Dundee United Church. The hymns sung were "Rock of Ages" and "Jesus Lover of My Soul."

The following acted as pall bearers: Arthur MacPherson, Murdoch Matheson, Elfin MacPhee, Murdoch MacPhee, John Dupasquiere and John MacBeth.

Interment was in Dundas cemetery.

Big Three divide German Navy

LONDON, Jan. 23 (CP) - Britain, the United States and Russia, announced tonight that the German Navy had been divided among them a tri-power communiqué said "operable surface units" of the German fleet, together with 30 submarines, had been split up on an equal basis.

At the same time the Admiralty disclosed officially that 100 surrendered German U-boats had been scuttled in the North Atlantic by the Royal Navy last November.

A total of 1,789 ships is involved - two cruisers, 30 destroyers and torpedo boats, 30 submarines, 46 depot ships and 1,679 "other units" including minesweepers, harbor patrol craft and similar ships.

Besides the 10 U-boats apiece, each country gets:

- United States - The 10,000-ton cruiser Prinz Eugen, seven destroyers and torpedo boats, 12 depot ships and 560 other units.
- Russia - The 6,000-ton cruiser Nueenberg, 10 destroyers and torpedo boats, 15 depot ships and 507 other units.
- Britain - 13 destroyers and torpedo boats, 21 depot ships and 612 other units.

All of Germany's battleships were sunk during the war and the split-up leaves Germany with no combat navy. Her merchant fleet, a British source said, will be divided later although the Germans will be allowed to retain fishing vessels with which to help feed her population.

Besides her sorrowing husband she leaves to mourn, three sons, Reginald, Norbert and Elmer and one daughter, Velma. Six of her children predeceased her, also one brother, Harold Dunn of Summerside and Eugene, Montague mourn her passing.

Her funeral at St. Mary's Church Montague on Saturday January 27th was largely attended. Requiem Mass for the repose of her soul was offered by her pastor, Rev. O. Kiggins who also consigned all that was mortal to her last resting place in the adjoining cemetery.

The pallbearers were Messrs: Joseph Power, Wm. Naddy, Norman Nicholson, Martin Hynes, John M. McLeod and Walter Sullivan. May she rest in peace.

Plain Restoration of Zulu Village

CAPE TOWN, Jan. 22 (CP) - Headquarters of the infamous King Dingaan, the Natal centre of the former royal kingdom of Zululand, may rise again from the ashes it became when the Zulus used a "scorched-earth" policy in 1838.

The South African Historical Monuments Commission is considering rebuilding the more important huts in the kraal. The intention to reopen some grain plots, which have remained untouched since Dingaan's defeat in 1838, may cause some difficulty, owing to the natives' superstition.

The history of Dingaan is one of murderous treachery. In 1837, Pieter Retief, leader of the first party of Boer immigrants to enter Natal, received formal concession to settle in the country and then was murdered by the Zulus under Dingaan's orders. After two unsuccessful attempts to avenge their slain in which the Boers were aided by the British, Dingaan's army was defeated on Dec. 16, 1838, by a Boer force under Andries Pretorius. The defeat of the Zulus as well as the anniversary of the proclamation of Boer independence in 1838, is celebrated in South Africa on Dingaan's Day, Dec. 16.

Members of the Historical Monuments Commission feel that if the natives are assured that the reconstruction of the kraal will perpetuate their history they will welcome the move.

Value Of Dairy Products Is Up

OTTAWA, Jan. 23 (CP) - Value of all products manufactured by dairy factories in Canada in 1944 totalled \$248,808,528, compared with \$243,843,220 in the preceding year, an increase of \$4,965,308, the Dominion Bureau of Statistics said today.

Production of creamery butter amounted to 268,777,262 pounds valued at \$101,534,710, compared with 251,709,476 pounds valued at \$108,103,728 in 1943.

Production of factory cheese amounted to 181,177,890 pounds valued at \$65,660,329, an increase in quantity over 1943 of 15,890,097 and an increase in value of \$9,108,803.

Production of concentrated milk - whole milk products, and milk by-products - amounted to 228,944,228 pounds valued at \$77,012,490 compared with 225,225,097 pounds valued at \$76,013,590 in the preceding year.

SAVED MANY LIVES

FLAMBOROUGH, England - (Reuters) - George Long, 66, cox-wain of the Flamborough lifeboat, retired at the end of 1943. He was credited with saving 30 lives and a few weeks before he retired his lifeboat saved 14 men from a tanker which was damaged in a collision.

LONDON - (Reuters) - The King has approved the appointment of Lord Harlech to be constable of Caernarvon Castle in succession to the late Earl Lloyd George.

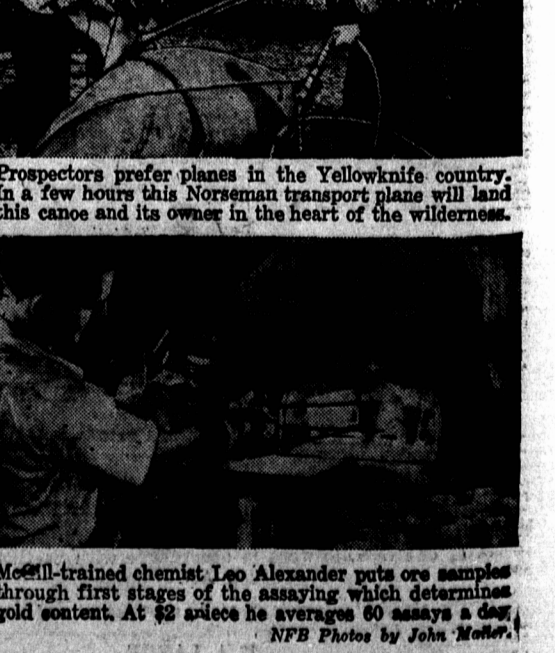
Prospector Tony Tennessy checks the compass bearing of his newly-staked claim.
