Over-exercise or long hours of work without sufficient rest causes heart weakness. That Body of Hours

MUCOUS COLITIS, COLITIS, SPASTIC COLON USUALLY DUE TO NERVOUSNESS

Because he (or more often she) is constipated and has distress of pain in the abdomen, it is a natural that a laxative and an enema is used to move the bowels and the accumulation of gas causing the pain.

When these individuals are examined it is found that they are usually between 20 to 40 years of age, are extremely nervous and are very easily "Abdominal distress, constipation, and flatulence (gas) are the leading complaints. The distress varies from a deep-seated continuous discomfort to severe cramp-like pain."

You can readily understand how these symptoms may be confused with appendicitis and gall bladder disturbances. Fortunately the X-ray helps to distinguish this irritable or spastic colon (large intestine) from ulcer, cancer, appendicitis, and gall bladder disease.

A mistake often made is to use rough foods to "irritate" the lazy bowels, whereas the nerves and muscles are already so active and tense that they partially close the bowel instead of opening it.
