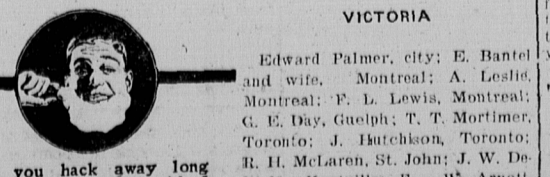

IN MEMORIAM MR. GEORGE E. KEEFE MEXICO CITY, Sept. 30.—Popocatepetl, the great volcano south-east of this city, is reported to be in more vigorous activity than usual. The inhabitants of the villages of Amecameca and Tlanacaas, at the base of the mountain, are leaving their homes, fearing a serious eruption. Two outbreaks have occurred during the past ten days, and reports reaching this city state that there has been a considerable flow of lava from the crater of the volcano.

FLOW OF OIL AT NORTH ALBERTA. WINNIPEG, Sept. 20.—The senior officials of the Imperial Oil Company now visiting here, have received telegraphic advices informing them that after drilling in the foothills west of Northern Alberta, for about three months a flow of gas to two million feet has been struck at a depth of 1,650 feet.

POPOCATEPETL ACTIVE. ATTEMPT TO BURN HOUSE. TORONTO, Sept. 30.—A deliberate attempt to burn a three-story house on Cecil street in this city late last night, is the belief of city firemen. Neighbors report that a man rushed out of the house a few minutes before the fire was noticed and the fire-fighters found walls cut through and spaces in the walls filled with straw soaked with gasoline and turpentine. The house was fully furnished, but no person was in it when the firemen arrived. The fire was quenched before it had made much progress.

MR. GEORGE E. KEEFE The death of Mr. George Edmund Keefe, took place at his home in Bay Fortune, on Thursday morning, Sept. 22nd, 1921, after several months' suffering from heart trouble. Mr. Keefe was born at St. Peter's Bay on March 4th, 1843, and here he spent his boyhood days. After his marriage to Miss Elizabeth Twissell he moved to Holly Bay, where he lived as a successful farmer for some twenty years, when he went to Boston with his family, returning about twelve years ago to make his home at Bay Fortune. Mr. Keefe was widely known and highly respected, and was mourned by a host of relatives and friends. The funeral which took place on Sabbath 25th, at the Bay Fortune cemetery, was largely attended. He leaves a widow and eight daughters all of whom were present at his funeral to mourn the loss of a devoted husband and father. The family have the sincere sympathy of the community and are recommended to a loving Heavenly Father's compassion and care, and to faith in His promises, "that are to the fathers and their children."
