PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

Mr. Chairman, Rev. Fathers, Ladies and Gentlemen:
Possibly the most eventful year in the history of Queen Square School is about to close, and it is

my privilege and pleasure to present for your information, the annual report of the activities of the school for the year 1939-40. When the destructive hordes of Nazi Germany invaded Poland last September, and brought forth a declaration of war from England and the British Commonwealth of Nations, Canada was one of the foremost units of that great body to take her place at the side of the Mother Country, in the fight for freedom and democracy. It was then that we, who have the interests of Queen Square most at heart, realized that we were to suffer a loss that would be most heavily felt in the school year about to begin. I refer to the temporary absence of our Principal, Capt. Leo F. MacDonald, of the 6th District Signals, and of our Vice-Principal Major E. J. H. Morrissey, of the Prince Edward Island Highlanders. Both of these men were granted leave of absence by the Board of School Trustees for the duration of the war.

It is with a feeling of great pride that we learn that the same sterling qualities which moved these men to the foremost ranks of the teaching profession in this Province, have served to add new laurels to them, in their response to the call of King and Country. Mr. MacDonald has been promoted to the Command of his Signal Company, and Mr. Morrissey has risen to the rank of Major in charge of an Infantry Training Centre.

To these absentees we add the name of Mr. Kenneth C. MacMillan, B. A., who resigned his position on the staff of this school, to take up his studies in that exalted vocation to which God called him. We are pleased to welcome to the staff Mr. Millan back to the City, after a most successful year's work at St. Augustine's Seminary in Toronto. So it was, due to the loss of the two administrative heads and the additional loss of a very valuable member of our staff that, as an Acting Principal, I began the year on September 11th, with considerable trepidation, fully realizing that such drastic changes in our organization called for considerable adjustment.

The vacancies on the staff were filled by the appointment of Mr. Plus Callaghan, Mr. J. H. Crokin, and Miss Fionnuala McTague. These teachers have fitted admirably into the work of the several grades to which they have been assigned, and have proved themselves valuable additions to our staff.

The continued illness of Miss Bernadette Blanchard necessitated her temporary absence from duty, and her place was very capably taken by her sister, Miss Beatrice Blanchard. We are pleased to be able to report that Miss Blanchard's condition is very much improved.

The enrollment for the year was 638, not quite as high as last year. Attendance for the year was not up to the usual high standard, owing to an epidemic of Scarlet Fever, Colds, etc. There was very little actual truancy, due for the most part to the increasing effort of our very efficient Training Officer, Mr. J. W. Brawders. I would like to take this opportunity to express my appreciation, and that of the whole staff, for his wholehearted cooperation. Despite this lack of truancy, however, the attendance for the year suffered through the pernicious habits of some parents keeping their boys at home on the slightest pretext. In this connection I wish to commend the work of the visiting committee of the Home and School Organization under the chairmanship of Mrs. W. D. Gillis. It becomes increasingly evident from year to year that parental control is the deciding factor in regular and punctual attendance. When you consider that Miss Moran's class of Grade 4 pupils, in the Junior Shield for Attendance, practically every month of the year, it seems to me that the irregular and unsatisfactory attendance of the intermediate grades is due to the fact that the authority in the home is changing into the hands of the children.

As far as the actual academic work of the school is concerned, I feel sure that the boys kept to the usual high standard of former years, although the reaction to the war may have had a disturbing influence, especially in the senior grades. Discipline presented no serious problems during the year, and I am proud to say that our boys responded magnificently to any appeal made to them in that particular respect.

During the year our Home and School Organization continued its efficient work in its usual harmonious and cooperative manner. Several executive meetings and one general meeting were held, all of which served to stimulate interest in school work. Owing to the increased pressure of work, it was deemed inadvisable to hold the annual meeting of the organization; this meeting will be held in the school re-orgs. To the Pres., Mr. J. F. Leightner, and to the members of his several committees, we owe a deep debt of gratitude.

The annual Empire Day exercises were held with a most interesting programme, the highlight of which was a very interesting and instructive address on "Citizenship" by our school friend, Mr. W. J. Brawders.

Our School Kitchen continued to function and to supply a much needed want in the school life of our pupils. To Rev. P. McMahon, D. D., Rector of St. Dunstan's Basilica to Rev. A. McDonald, S. J., Rector of Holy Redeemer Parish, to Mr. J. F. Leightner and his fellow employees of the Canadian National Railway, to Dr. W. J. P. MacMillan, and to the many others who contributed to the upkeep of this department of our school, we extend our most sincere thanks.

Athletics, which always play an important part in our school work, were capably carried on under the supervision of Vice-Principal Mr. Doucette, and our boys acquitted themselves in true Queen Square fashion, both on the football field and the hockey rink. Our ice sports were augmented again, after a lapse of several years, were a decided success. To the merchants and others who contributed to our programme, and to Dr. P. C. Dougan and Mr. James LeClair, who donated donated cups for competition, the boys are indeed grateful. Their generosity was a leading factor in the success of the sports.

Our annual concert was participated in with the usual enthusiasm. To the lady teachers of the staff, assisted by Mr. Doucette in the musical numbers, must go the greater share of the credit for this important activity. The training of children, the making of costumes, and the many tasks in connection with the programme, were undertaken by them in a manner typical of the wholehearted support and cooperation accorded
