PROVINCIAL LEGISLATURE

WEDNESDAY

Attended with the customary spectacular ceremony and favoured with splendid weather, the Legislature of P. E. Island was opened at the Provincial Building, Charlottetown yesterday afternoon.

There was a good attendance of members, the House in the absence of the Hon. J. A. Mathieson being led by Hon. W. S. Stewart, acting Premier.

Punctually at three o'clock the Lieut. Governor entered the Chamber and, the House standing, read the Address from the Throne, which was listened to with keen attention.

The past year has been, in general, favourable for Agriculture, and a beautiful harvest has been secured, although considerable damage was done in some sections by heavy and long-continued rains.

The development of fox farming has continued at an increasing ratio. The specially favourable conditions of climate, soil and expert knowledge in the breeding of silver foxes has led to a marvellous growth of this industry to the great profit of the breeders and of the Province generally.

The introduction of Karakul sheep breeding promises to make an important addition to the industries of our Province.

The oyster fisheries, which had once been prolific, were by overfishing in want of adequate protection and by the increase of starfish, vermin on extirpation, now promise to become a great source of provincial wealth and in time to give profitable and continuous employment to large numbers of our citizens.

An Inter-provincial Conference was held in Ottawa in October last, at which every Province in Canada was represented. Several of the questions considered were of the first importance, and we confidently hope that as a result of the presentation of claims before the Conference and the Government of Canada, full justice will be done. The official report of the proceedings will be placed before you.

The Fiftieth Anniversary of the First Confederation Conference to be celebrated here during the present year will mark a period of the first importance to all Canada. It will particularly mark the fulfilment of the Confederation agreement by linking this Island with the transportation system of Canada and the improved financial terms and conditions which at length have put this Province on a solvent and progressive basis in the Confederation.

A Joint Stock Companies' Act and other important legislation will be submitted for your consideration.

The Accounts of the Revenue and Expenditure for the past year and the various Departments of the Government together with the Estimates for the current year, will be laid before you.

To these and all other matters that may be submitted to you I invite your earnest attention.

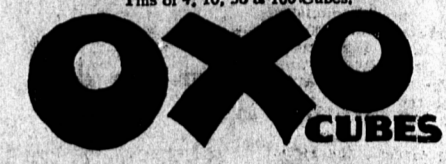
