WOOL MARKETING

Wool will be received at the Potato Growers' Warehouse at the foot of Prince Street, Charlottetown, after June 17th. Wool shipped by rail should be carefully tagged and addressed to the Wool Grading Station, Charlottetown, "Freight Collect."

In shipping, each fleece should be tied separately with paper string and packed in old, but clean sackings. Do not ship in large number of bags. Use one large sack if at all possible, as this aids in checking.

It is in your interest to see that wool is properly prepared for market. Growers should

- 1. Remove all tags and dung locks before tying each fleece.
2. Any burry, chaffy, or strawy portions of wool should also be removed and shipped separately.
3. Sheep should be shorn when dry, and wool should be stored in a place free from dampness.

All wool should be delivered between June 16th and July 19th.

Island Banker In New York

(Long Island Sunday Times) Ernest E. Macdonald, a ruddy, stocky man of 59 doesn't care an iota about politics and he would rather be a banker any day of the week.

It couldn't be an accident, therefore, that he is executive vice-president for Queens of the Bank of Manhattan company and that he heads the 31 branches in this borough.

We visited him in his Jamaica offices at the bank headquarters, 161-10 Jamaica avenue. It is a plush, walnut-paneled affair, and from behind a solid, walnut desk he commands the works. Macdonald has the rugged aspect of the outdoors man and wears big horn-rimmed glasses only when he works behind his desk.

"A few years ago a man came into my office and asked me to run for comptroller," Macdonald recalls. "I looked at him. He was serious, though. I thought he was kidding. Of course, I turned him down. I couldn't live on the salary they pay. And after you get beaten at the next election—then what? You have to scurry around looking for another job." He shook his head. "No, that's not the life for me."

There was the time LaGuardia asked him to head the Midtown Tunnel Authority. Macdonald said no firmly.

"But Mac," pleaded the Little Flower, "there are a thousand men in New York crying their eyes out for that job. How can you turn it down?"

He did take an appointment to the Board of Higher Education in 1937, but resigned a year later for personal reasons. Most of his reasons are connected with his work in supervising the huge string of banks in Queens, but he does find time to be active in the Knights of Columbus, the Boy Scouts, Catholic Charities, and the United Hospital Fund.

Invariably when he gets into an organization they put him to work as treasurer.

"I think I'm serving my 28th or 29th term in that office with the Queens Chamber of Commerce," he mused. Macdonald speaks in machine-gun sentences and once in a while he will punctuate them with a shy grin.

He has a drawer full of maps and he dug down and pulled out a map of Nova Scotia. Although he has been in Queens for 23 years, he was born on Prince Edward Island, one of a family of nine children. He spent his youth in Charlottetown and his eyes reveal the pride he feels for the beauty of that hardy countryside.

One day Macdonald decided that life at Prince of Wales College was a beautiful tan ready for more dull. He walked down the street, passed a bank and got a job as a junior clerk. Since then he has been in one bank or another, behind a screen or behind a desk.

"How does a fellow get into banking?" He mulled that question over and grinned. "The way they all do, I suppose. You're a young fellow. You walk past a bank. You look in. Then you think

Across Canada this summer there will be a series of 'Gilwell' camps dedicated to the training of leaders for Wolf Cub Packs and Boy Scout Troops. 'Gilwell' training is the official series of courses in Scout leadership throughout the world. 1947 marks the 25th anniversary of Gilwell Training in Canada. E. F. Mills, formerly of Winnipeg, is now Executive Commissioner for Training at Dominion Scout Headquarters in Ottawa.

The 6th Galt Sea Scout Group is to have a new leadership headquarters. The Corporation of the City of Galt, Ont., has donated four lots overlooking the Grand River and the sponsor of the group, the Galt Civic Service Club, has voted financial and physical aid to build the new headquarters. Already the Sea Scouts have cleared the site and have commenced work on the foundation of the new building.

His big dream is the day when he retires at 65.
