For this reason commercial and industrial business will have to be adjusted to the volume of money available with which to carry on business. Temporary high rates will curtail a tendency to over extension.

THE STOCK MARKET.

The principal factor in the stock

market today is the confusion of mind, caused by the irregularity in prices. It is strange how a halt after a nominal advance in prices has taken place, generates doubt among the holders of stocks. This uncertainty of mind itself causes selling of securities and consequently adds to the irregularity. However, it is such halts in an upward movement which makes a firm foundation on which to continue an advance, because by the time the market is again under way the timid holder of securities has disposed of his stock to more confident buyers who are willing to hold for higher prices. A waiting period is encountered now and then in all upward movements. Such a waiting period, as a rule, forecasts another advance of from \$5 to \$8 a share in the price of the actively dealt in stocks.

At the present time the stock market seems to be in exactly such a period as has been described. All indications point towards higher prices. The only factor against prices is the rates which obtain for call money. Otherwise the temper of the country is most optimistic and there is greater commercial and industrial activity than we have experienced since the year 1909. The stock market outlook has not been so propitious for many months.

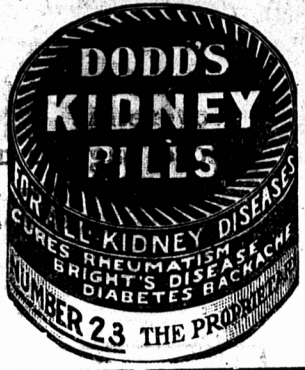

NOTED PHILOLOGIST DEAD.

LONDON, Oct. 7.—The death occurred today of Professor Rev. Walter William Skeat, of Cambridge University, one of the most widely known professors of philology. He was seventy-six years of age, having been born in London on November 21, 1835.

MARRIED IN YOUTHFUL WIFE

NEW YORK, October 7.—Lionel E. Lawrence, graduate of the United States Naval Academy, actor, stage manager and producer, and probably the only man since King Solomon who can give his own name in plural, announced that he had married a girl whose name he has not yet revealed.

His youngest wife became such on August 13, 1912, when Rabbi A. H. Spiegel officiated. Lawrence and his bride are the daughter of Chicago, two weeks after Lawrence's first marriage to Miss Doobert.

Lawrence's first round trip on the matrimonial sea was in 1881. He has forgotten the first name of Miss Cummings, his first wife, and cannot remember either Christian or family name of the woman he married in New Orleans in 1897. She was wife No. 16, who divorced him in four months.
