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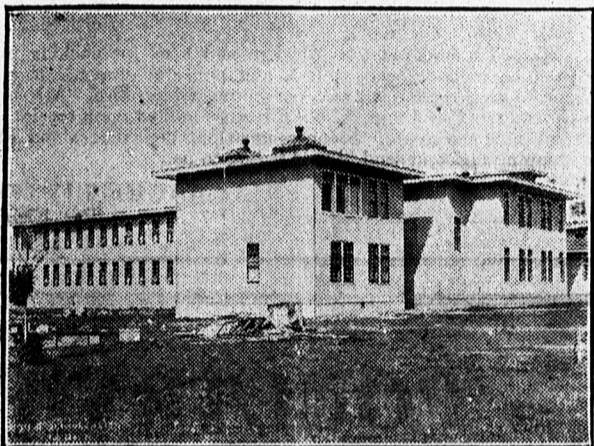

first floor are the officers dining room, the kitchen and the men's dining room. The kitchen is a model one in every particular and is equipped with all that modern science can furnish in the way of cooking devices. In addition to a large John Bull range there is a steam heater containing three sections in which six different varieties of food can be cooked at once simply by turning on steam; coffee, tea and hot water urns each having a capacity of 17 gallons; meat, bread and vegetable slicers; steam heater in which dishes may be kept hot on way to the dining rooms; dishwashing equipment and in short everything that goes towards making cooking scientific and sanitary.

Altogether the new Convalescent Home is a credit to the Government and to the province. It goes as near as it is possible to go towards giving the convalescent soldiers the care and attention and comfort they have so richly merited; towards repaying them in part the great debt the province and Canada and the world owe them for the sacrifice they made.

The hospital with its equipment and its capable nurses and doctors can supply only hospital care; the rest must be done by the citizens. Reading matter will be needed; flowers, kindness, sympathy and cheer will be needed. For these they have a right to look to the citizens and, from past experience, it is safe to assure them these will be forthcoming.

PREPARATORY TO PEACE CONFERENCE

Important Conference to be Held in London Between the Imperial and Dominions Statesmen—Forthcoming Meetings Preparatory to the Great Peace Conference to be Convened in the Very Near Future. Premier Borden and Colleagues en route for London.

London, Nov. 14.—(Canadian Press despatch from Reuters Limited)—Reuter's agency learns that the imperial war cabinet will shortly resume its sitting in order to deliberate on the terms of peace. Moreover, there will be important conferences and discussions in London between the imperial and dominions statesmen

London, Nov. 14.—(British Wireless Service)—The Times says that in addition to General Botha, the South African Premier, the forthcoming meetings of the Imperial Cabinet preparatory to the peace conference. Canada will be represented by Sir Robert Borden, Prime Minister and a number of his colleagues and advisers; Australia by Premier Hughes and Sir Joseph Cook, Minister of the Navy; New Zealand by her Prime Minister, Mr. Massey and Sir Joseph Ward, and Newfoundland by Premier Lloyd.

PEACE AN ISSUE IN BRITISH ELECTIONS

London, Nov. 14.—(British Wireless Service)—"One of the principal issues at the forthcoming general election will be the nature of the peace settlement. It will mean the settlement of the word."

Premier Lloyd George made this announcement in an address to his liberal supporters on November 11.

"What are the principles on which that settlement is to be effected?" he asked. "Are we to lapse back into the old national rivalries, animosities and competitive armaments, or are we to initiate the reign on earth of the Prince of Peace? It is the duty of Liberalism to use its influence to ensure that it shall be a reign of peace."

"What are the conditions of peace? They must lead to a settlement which will be fundamentally just. No settlement that contravenes the principles of eternal justice will be a permanent one. The peace of 1871 imposed by Germany on France outraged all the principles of justice and fair play. Let us be warned by that example."

We must not allow any sense of revenge, any spirit of greed, any grasping desire to override the fundamental principles of righteousness. Vigorous attempts will be made to hector and bully the Government in an endeavor to make them depart from the strict principles of right and to satisfy some base, sordid, squalid ideas of vengeance and of avarice. We must relentlessly set our faces against that.

GRAVE SITUATION NOW IN GERMANY

London, Nov. 14.—A note of deep anxiety lest the situation in Germany degenerate into Bolshevism is struck by all the editorials in the London newspapers today. The continued absence of information which would tend to throw further light on the fragmentary one-sided knowledge of the actual, social and administrative situation in Germany, prevents the views here.

President Wilson's "timely counsel" is hailed with unanimous editorial approval and his warning that hunger leads to madness is quoted as touching a vital chord. It is admitted by newspapers of all shades of political opinion that Germany must be fed, not only as a business proposition, inasmuch as if she starved to death she could not pay what she owes.

GOLDEN WEDDING

Mr. and Mrs. John J. Davies, of Hotel Davies celebrated the fiftieth anniversary of their wedding yesterday when the gentlemen guests of the hotel presented them with an address and purse of gold. Although the occasion was marred by Mrs. Davies' indisposition owing to an accident and the original program was abandoned in consequence, still brief complimentary remarks supplemented the address, which were feelingly acknowledged by Mr. Davies.

Mr. and Mrs. Davies have been residents of this city almost ever since they first shared each others cares or happiness. Their first years of married life in their native Province of Nova Scotia bear evidence of prudence and frugality in shaping a career which was destined to be of usefulness and comfort to that class, made up for the most part of commercial gentlemen, whose business temporarily called them from their own fireside. Within a few years their efforts were so successful that they were able to secure the largest and best business in this city and Province, the reputation of which was enhanced under the conduct of its affairs. Hotel Davies has ever been the synonym of perfection and its reputation went out to The Cliff which they conducted as a summer hotel when they felt a respite from the larger and more continuous responsibilities was due to them as the sheaves of their lives goldened.

For many years Mr. Davies was prominent in the affairs of this city and Province and has ever been a social favorite in town and country while Mrs. Davies has always commanded the affection and esteem of all classes. GERMAN ARMY OFFICIALS ATTACKED IN POLAND

GENEVA, Nov. 14.—(Tuesday, by the A.P.)—Baron Von Wangelheim, the German military governor of occupied Poland has issued a proclamation in which he declares that in the midst of the realization of Poland of her national ideas a section of the population, the enemies of order are attacking like brigades the German army officials and are seeking to cut communications. The proclamation threatens that most severe measures will be taken against those elements and concludes: "Take care lest a fresh struggle breaks out and your beautiful country be reduced to ruins thanks to a few agitators."
