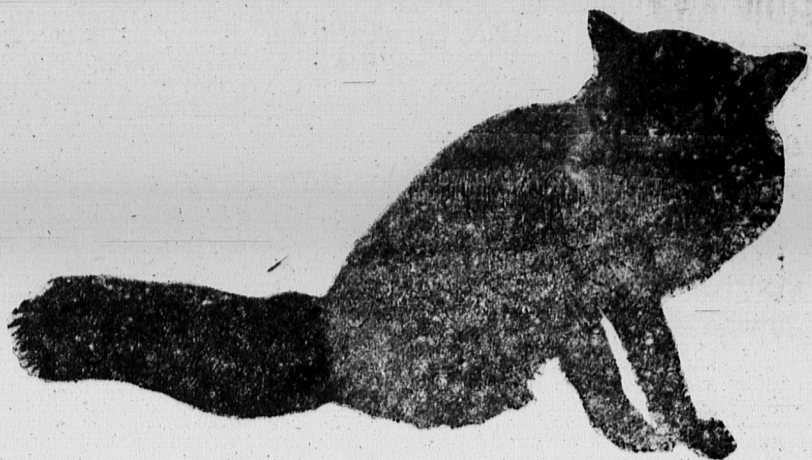

PETER HUGHES.

The death occurred at Fort Augustus on March 27th of Peter Hughes, an old and respected resident of that place at the advanced age of 83 years. Her funeral which was a very large one took place on Thursday morning April 4th to St. Ann's Church, Lot 45, where a requiem high Mass was celebrated by Rev. Dr. Curran. After which all that was mortal of a kind, loving wife and mother was laid to rest in the adjoining cemetery.

Besides her sorrowing husband and five small children including an infant baby, she leaves to mourn, a father and mother, four sisters and three brothers. To the bereaved husband and family the heartfelt sympathy of the whole community is extended in their sad trial. May her soul rest in peace.

ST. LOUIS, Mo., April 4.—Six persons are known to be dead, scores were injured and property damage totaling many thousands of dollars was done by tornadoes last night in Missouri, according to reports received here early today.

Mrs. Logan On Trial For Arson

AMHERST, N.S., April 5.—The hearing of Mrs. J. G. Logan was held this afternoon before Magistrate Clegg. Mrs. Logan is charged with attempted murder by the Insurance Companies. It is alleged that she placed a large quantity of explosive beneath the steps of the building on Croft Street known as the Logan Lodge and asked Mrs. Adolph Skinner to touch a match to the same. While she (Mrs. Logan) was there in Scotland, The Insurance Companies decided to take up the case and brought the matter to the court. This afternoon Mrs. Adolph Skinner, a colored lady who was cook at a boarding house was the first witness and it is expected that her testimony will have an important bearing upon the case. Mrs. Skinner in her testimony said that she was offered five hundred dollars to touch a match to the inflammable material placed beneath the stairs but she treated the matter as a joke. The witnesses further said that the accused was fired of living in Amherst as the case of everything had advanced so rapidly Mrs. Logan was committed for trial at the session of the Supreme Court.

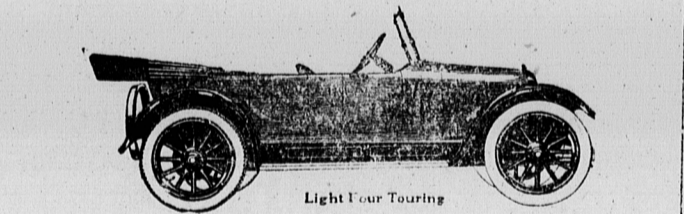
