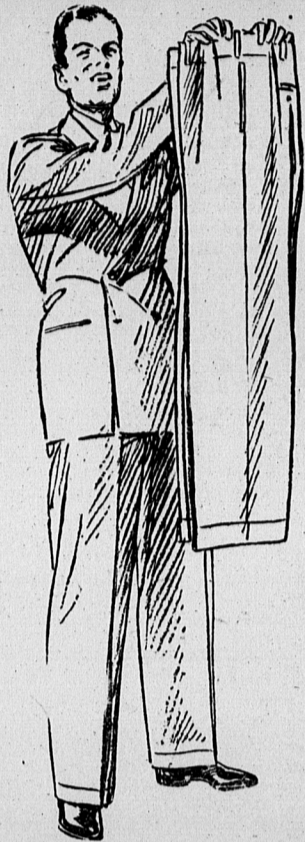

—S-SIDE TOWN COUNCIL MEETING—The adjourned meeting of the Summerside Town Council was held in the Council Chamber on Friday last. Mayor Manson presided over a full council Board. After the reading of the minutes of the previous meeting bills were passed as follows: Town paid bills \$7616.59 Unpaid \$2204.59. Electric Light paid bills \$845.81. Unpaid bills \$1206.11. A motion approving of the payment to the School Board of \$25,000 for building purposes was passed, moved by Coun. Phillips and seconded by Coun. MacNeill. The application of Maynard Lefurgey to inspect the stove pipes of residences in the Town was accepted. The fee to be 25 cents an hour

not to exceed fifteen dollars. The reports of the committees were brought in and approved. Coun. Bell, chairman of the finance committee reported that the estimates in all departments were under those of last year. \$2,000 had yet to be received from the Provincial Government for the use of the Town tractor. Coun. McNeill, chairman of the streets committee reported that there was still a little more repair work needed on the Water St. sidewalk as there were several dangerous places where the concrete that these repairs should be done and request Coun. McNeill to look after this matter. Coun. Phillips, chairman of the Police Committee reported 35 arrests and convictions for drunkenness, two for vagrancy, one for stealing, one for driving to the common danger. Fines collected \$257.50. A motion was passed to ask for tenders for fifty ton of Sidney screened coal to heat the Town building. Tenders to close on Oc-

tober 26th. After considerable discussion on motion of Coun. Phillips which was seconded by Coun. McNeill it was agreed to increase the salaries of Police Officer Kinch and Police Officer White \$10 per month. Coun. Schurman did not support this motion as he argued that in view of the scarcity of money this was not the time to raise salaries although he agreed that the police have been doing good work in the town. Coun. Bell said the excellent work of the police justifies the advance of pay which is not exactly a raise but bringing the salary up to what is understood the officers would receive if they made good. Coun. Bell said that the Police should be paid a sufficient sum to allow them to live decently and to place them above the temptations of the law are subject to if they are underpaid. Coun. Schurman, chairman of the Electric Light committee gave a good report and showed an increase over last month in the consumption of

current used although it was 3 per cent less than the corresponding month last year. Last month was ten per cent less. So that was an improvement. Coun. Kelly and Coun. Grady gave good report for the Property, Fire and Assessment departments. Council adjourned until Oct. 26th.—S
