Sunday School Lesson

THE JEWS RETURN FROM CAPTIVITY July 30th.

Golden Text—And we know that all things work together for good to them that love God.—Romans VIII, 28.

Lesson Text—Jer. XXIX: 1-14. For entire lesson see Jer. XXIX: 10-14, Ezra ch. 1.

Time.—About B. C. 538.

Place.—Babylon.

Jeremiah's twenty ninth chapter is a letter which he wrote to the exiles in Babylon to warn them against those false prophets who predict for them a speedy return from captivity. He assures them that their exile shall last, as Jehovah has said, for seventy years, but he also reminds them of God's promise that when the appointed time has come they shall be permitted to return to their own land.

"For, thus saith the Lord," a solemn sentence solemnly introduced. "After seventy years are accomplished at Babylon." The seventy years was in round numbers, the duration of the empire of Nebuchadnezzar and his successors, and, therefore of the exile, since Cyrus, founder of the new dynasty, immediately allowed the exiles to return. It was a mystic number ten times the sacred number seven. "I will visit you," To "visit" frequently, has the sense of taking notice or paying heed to. "And perform my good word toward you. This good word was the promise (recorded in Jer. XXIV: 6-XXVII: 22) that the Jewish exiles should be restored to their land. "In causing you to return to this place," Jerusalem, whence Jeremiah was writing. "Now in the first year of Cyrus, King of Persia" (Ezra 1:1) Not the first year of his reign as King of Persia, but perhaps nine years later, the first year of his reign as king of Babylonia. "The Lord stirred up the spirit of Cyrus King of Persia." By a direct influence probably through the instrumentality of Daniel. "And put it also in writing." This decree was the emancipation proclamation of the Hebrew race, and it was of the utmost importance to them that it should be in writing and accessible for reference among the state records of Cyrus.

"All the kingdoms of the earth." This is evidently an exaggeration since Egypt, for example, was not under the sway of Cyrus. "And His hath charged me to bulg Him and house at Jerusalem." Josephus (Ant. Jud. XI, 1) says that the prophecy to be a command from God, which he must obey. "Who is there among you of all His people." Cyrus includes in his permission to return all the Jews of the Northern kingdom, the so-called lost tribes, as well as the Southern "His God be with him." A plus wish, almost a blessing indicative of the deep religious feeling and great goodness of heart which characterized Cyrus alone of Persian monarchs. "And build the house of the Lord, God of Israel." "Israel" after the "exile" meant all the Jews as before the disruption of the kingdom. "Let the men of his place help him." The kindly disposed monarch wishes that no Jew shall be prevented by his poverty from returning to his own land. "Beside the free-will offering for the house of God." Cyrus was himself about to make such an offering by returning the temple service of gold and silver. "Then rose up the chief of the fathers of Judah and Benjamin." A Jewish tribe was divided into families (or clans) and each family subdivided into houses. The tribe of Benjamin and Southern kingdoms is connected with Judah, though most of its members adhered to Israel. "To go up to build the house of the Lord." Not the freedom of the Jews is set forth as the great end of the return, but the restoration of God's house. "And all they that were about them strengthened their hands." This expression means the heathen neighbors of the returning Jews and doubtless also, it includes the Jews that did not choose to return. "Which Nebuchadnezzar had brought forth out of Jerusalem." The carrying off of sacred vessels, as well as images from temples is often represented in the Assyrian sculptures. It was a practice even of the Romans, and is commemorated on the Arch of Titus, where the seven-branched candlestick of the Jewish temple is represented as borne in triumph by Roman soldiers. "The house of his gods." Probably the temple of Nebuchadnezzar's favorite deity, Marduk (Merodach) "By the hand of Mithredath the treasurer. Mithredath (Mithradates) means "dedicated to Mithra, the Persian sun god. Treasure was often kept

in temples as being the safest from robbery, and this man was in charge of the temple treasury. "And numbered them unto Sheshbazzar, the prince of Judah." There is little doubt that Sheshbazzar, was the name by which Zerubbabel, the Jew who led this first party of returned exiles, was known among the Babylonians. He was the descendant and legal successor of Jehoiachin, king of Judah. "All the vessels—were five thousand four hundred." The total of the vessels enumerated in verses 9, 10, is 2,499, less than half this total. There is some corruption in the text or the preceding verses omit to mention many smaller vessels.

The return to Jerusalem meant a long, hard journey. It meant that the Jews must give up their precarious spot in the home-land yet for the sake of rebuilding the temple many of the devout among the Jews returned. Of the less religiously inclined, not a few preferred to remain in Babylon.

MACHINE FOR PICKING COTTON

For a long time one of the great difficulties in raising cotton has been the harvesting of the vast crops in the few short months after they ripen before the frost sets in, and it is hoped that a brilliant invention just put on the market will solve this problem.

It is the electric cotton-picker machine which makes it possible for a person to pick 500 or 600 pounds of cotton per day, instead of slightly over 100, which is the limit by hand.

The machine is made up of set of revolving brushes encased in a small metal frame about the size of a man's fist, with an opening in the hand exposing the brushes and large enough to grasp a boll of cotton. The two brushes revolve toward each other with a comb-like motion, pulling the cotton out of the boll.

The brushes in the head are driven by a flexible drive shaft, about three feet long, connected with a small electric motor suspended near the head. The current is obtained from a small generator mounted on an ordinary gasoline farm tractor.

Typhoid Epidemic Traced to Clams

NEW HAVEN, Conn., July 28.—That the typhoid epidemic in this city, has claimed a number of Yale professors and students among its victims since June 1, has been definitely traced to infected little neck clams served at three well known clubs in the city. is the conclusion reached by Dr. Dwight M. Lewis, city epidemiologist.

Dr. Lewis declared that the clams used in two of the clubs were traced to a dealer who had placed them in the "historically polluted Quinnipiac River," keeping after being received here. The other club bought clams from a small dealer who also "floats" them in the Quinnipiac.
