**HOTEL WANTED.**

Year after year during the stress of the tourist season the want of hotel accommodation for the better class of tourists is sadly felt, and was never more felt than during the past summer. At such times there is usually much talk about how the want can be supplied, but as travel drops off in the fall season the people become busy with other affairs and the hotel project drops to the back-ground until another summer season and more tourists have come again. It is then too late to build and the project goes over for another year. It is obvious that if anything effectual is to be accomplished for next year, time must be taken by the forelock and preparations must begin very shortly. It is well known that the Island is year by year becoming better known and in higher favor as a summer resort. The one thing most necessary to the further development of tourist travel in this direction is a suitable hotel in this city. Such an hotel would not in any way injure, but would help our existing hotels by the great increase of general travel which it would bring about. This has proved true in every Canadian city where the experiment has been tried. The Windsor in Montreal and Frontenac in Quebec have admittedly helped the general hotel business in those cities while creating extensive and profitable business largely of a new class for themselves. At the same time these palace hotels have greatly increased the tourist traffic to and from the cities where they are located, much to the advantage of railway and steamboat lines connecting with them, and of livery stables, stores and almost every line of local business.

There are only a few more telephones in London than there are in Montreal. This is owing in part to British conservatism and partly to the very high charge for telephones in London.

We had a narrow escape from a silver thaw yesterday, the rain freezing as it fell for a short time. The process stopped before the telephone wires had become sufficiently loaded to cause breakage.

The telegraph connection with the Mainland still remains interrupted. A number of private messages were brought over by the Princess last evening but from some unexplained reason no despatches were received for THE GUARDIAN.

So great has been the benefit to railway and transportation lines that the great railway and steamboat companies, such as the Canadian Pacific Railway and the Plant Line of steamships have found it profitable to go largely into the hotel business wherever the existing hotel accommodation was not sufficient. Why should not the Government Railway Department do the same? The Government controls the trunk lines of railway throughout the Maritime Provinces. The Government does not hesitate to spend hundreds of thousands upon wharves, piers and elevators wherever they may be needed for the accommodation of existing freight traffic or the development of new freight traffic. Why should this enterprise be confined to freight alone? The development of passenger traffic is equally important and even more profitable. Why then may not the Government as a great common carrier, do the same things as the great railway companies do in regard to creating hotel accommodation for tourists?

We throw out the suggestion as a possible solution of the problem presented. The matter is one worthy of being taken up by the Federal Government, or by the Federal and Local Governments conjointly, providing a site and providing or guaranteeing the necessary funds. The hotel need not necessarily be under direct Government management. It would perhaps be better that it should be leased for a term of years to a capable hotel manager. There are many good sites. It has been suggested that with the contemplated abandonment of Government House as an official residence hereafter, a fine site and excellent grounds with the best possible outlook might there be obtained. This is a suggestion only. The main thing is that, by whatever means and by whomsoever built we shall have the new hotel, and have it in time for the large volume of tourist travel expected for the next year.
