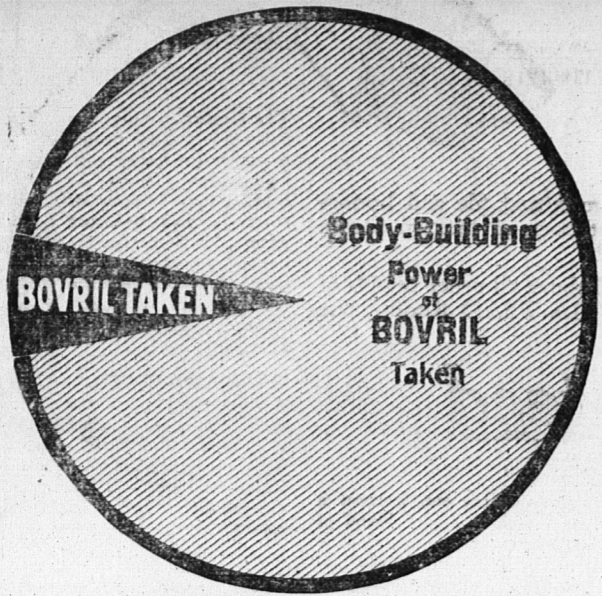

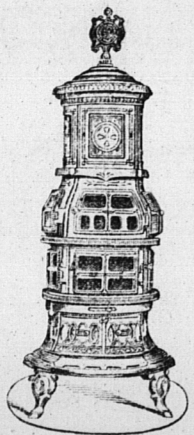

### LOUISBURG WELCOMES LIEUT. SKINNER.

LOUISBURG, October 7.—A very pretty scene took place last evening in front of the residence of Mrs. D. M. Skinner, when the Louisburg band turned out to serenade her son, Lieut. George Skinner, who had returned during the day with his bride. George Skinner was the first Louisburg boy to volunteer for overseas service, and was in khaki within a few days of the declaration of war. He joined the first Canadian battalion at Winnipeg, and was soon doing his bit in Flanders. In June last he was severely wounded in the knee and back, and was in the hospital for a considerable time, after which he was allowed to return to Canada on furlough.

Arriving back at Winnipeg he met the girl he left behind him, and was married there to Miss Christine Hattie. Lieut. Skinner did not leave Canada as a lieutenant, but as a private, and won his promotion on the field, and his friends feel justly proud of him. He is rather reticent about his experience at the front, but expresses a desire to get back in the game, and be in at the final triumph, not because of his love of war, but because he considers it his sacred duty. He has, however, to undergo another operation on his knee, which is not progressing as well as it might, and will leave for Winnipeg on the 9th inst. to report to the military authorities there.

After a few selections by the band, Rev. Dr. Draper presented Lieutenant Skinner with a purse as a small token of appreciation of his friends in town to which he fittingly responded.

## Venezelos Will Lead Troops Against Bulgars

(Canadian Press Despatch)

LONDON, October 13.—The Exchange Telegraph company's Athens correspondent quotes former Premier Venezelos as declaring, in a speech at Saloniki, that he has placed himself at the head of a movement which was bound to succeed.

"The islands have all adhered to the movement, and are prepared to accept the mobilization which will be declared shortly," said Venezelos. "The constitution must be reversed, even if we have to march without Athens and old Greece. We intend to march against Ferdinand and his treacherous troops."

LONDON, October 13.—Venezelos is preparing to lead his followers against Ferdinand, according to a despatch received here tonight from the Exchange Telegraph company's Athens correspondent.

Greece's former premier is quoted as declaring in a speech at Saloniki, that he had placed himself at the head of a movement that was bound to succeed.

"The islands have all adhered to the movement, and are prepared to accept the mobilization which will be declared shortly," M. Venezelos is quoted as saying.

"The constitution must be reversed even if we have to march without Athens and old Greece. We intend to march against Ferdinand and his treacherous troops."

"The organization of the provisional movement is almost completed, according to reports. Mytilene will probably be its seat."

General Zimbrakatis took the oath of allegiance as minister of war in the provisional government last Tuesday, it is reported, in the presence of M. Venezelos, Vice-Admiral Comnouriotis and General Dangis.

A communication issued by the Greek government yesterday, reciting the demands made by Admiral D'Artinge du Fournet, commander of the allied naval forces at Piræus, shows that the ultimatum was much more comprehensive than was understood at first. While submitting to what it terms "an imperative necessity," the Greek government protests against the demands.

### OPERATORS HELD SECRET OF TIE-UP SENDING UP WHEAT.

LONDON, Oct. 11.—Chicago grain market operators' secret connivance behind speculative holding of wheat by Canadian and American interests has been revealed by news from Australia that Australia had over 2,000,000 quarters of wheat to spare on October 9. Over half of the season's surplus remained unshipped, on account of the Australian government's having failed to find vessels. It is asked on all sides why did not the British government inform parliament and break the market control held by speculators in Chicago and Winnipeg. The speculators with the knowledge that Australia must leave us 60,000,000 quarters out of our calculations, felt confident of holding their own wheat at 70s, 75s and even 80s a quarter. Sufficient shipping is promised for future wheat that the crisis can be dominated if 5,000,000 quarters of Australian wheat can be moved between now and October, 1917.

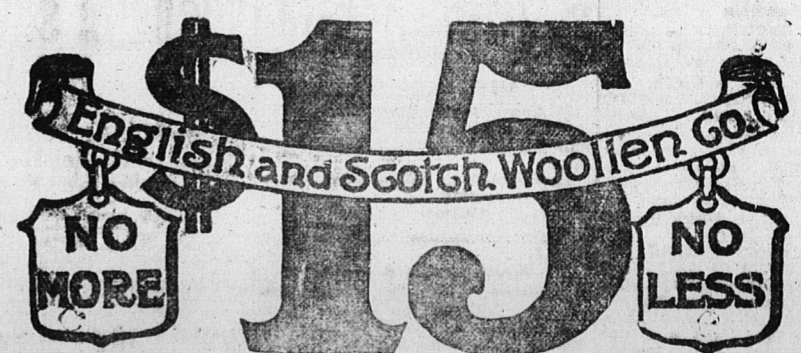
