Liberal Rally At Georgetown

At a well attended Liberal rally held in the Georgetown Hall on Wednesday night, Mr. T. J. Kitchham, Liberal candidate for Kings County said that in view of the fact that this district was primarily a fishing centre, it could view with confidence the strong Liberal platform for the fishing industry. He commended Dr. Grant for the fine work in public projects, such as wharves and boat-harbours in a time of many shortages of material. He went on to refute certain charges of the Conservatives saying that, although there did exist a freight rate differential, the grain assistance act provided for this difference, thereby permitting East and West products to compete favourably on the Central Provinces markets. He further stated that the Conservative policy with regard to the reduction of the Civil Service was inconsistent. One speaker, he said, indicated that their numbers would be reduced, while another in Ottawa had stated that their pay should be raised, which gave indication that the Conservatives had one policy for one section of the country, and another for a different section. Mr. George Saville compared the records of the Liberals and the Conservatives since Confederation, showing that prosperity had always reigned under a Liberal regime, and poor times under the Conservatives. He said also that the Georgetown road would be part of the trans-Canada highway. He dealt at great length with the fisheries, stating that the Liberals had continually given help to the fishermen in time of need through the Fishermen's Loan Board, and direct monies in compensation for loss of equipment in 1938. In this way the fishing fleet was kept in operation, and was able to reap the benefits of increased profits during the war boom. He stated that Canada's natural market was the U.S.A., and that they wanted our products. Premier Walter Jones pointed out the advantages of the bait (Continued on Page 15)
