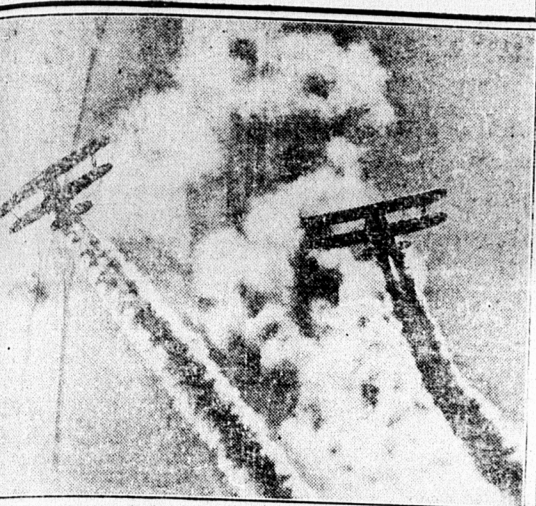

The SNAPSHOT GUILD FILTERS FOR BETTER PICTURES



In taking this shot, a filter was used to reproduce the sky tone so that the white smoke would stand out. Try filters—they'll improve your pictures, and add interest.

COLOR filters—simple little devices that slip on over your camera lens—can add a lot to the quality and value of your snapshots. If you've never used filters, now is a good time to start. All the experts use them, and they'll mark the forward step in your own personal photography.

Slip a medium yellow K2 filter on your lens, load the camera with any good "chrome" or "pan" film, and you get pictures with more natural tone values. Or, in technical phrase, more accurate rendering of relative brightnesses as seen at the eye. Which, briefly, means that your picture of any outdoor object will come closer to showing things as you saw them when you snapped the shutter.

Slip a deep yellow G filter on your lens, and you'll get clearer, crisper pictures of distant scenes at would look hazy in an "unfiltered" shot. You'll also get skies that look deeper than normal in every effective in some picture shots.

For spectacular effects, very dark skies, and exaggerated contrast, lead the camera with "pan" film or infra-red film, and slip a red "A" filter on the lens. Don't use the red filter with other types of film than panchromatic or infra-red; it's for these only.

From the effects described, you can see that filters open up an interesting new range of picture possibilities. The K-2 is the best all-around filter, so start with that, adding the G and A when you are ready to branch out into dramatic "effect" shots.

Every filter, of course, cuts out part of the light to which a film is sensitive, so exposure must be increased accordingly. Each filter's "exposure factor" is constant for each film, and exposure adjustment is not hard to calculate; but the easiest method is to use a pocket filter guide of the dial type. These cost but a few cents, and readily indicate the exact lens opening needed in a particular situation.

If you would improve your photography—make use of filters. The results will surprise you—in fact, you'll probably want to know, "Why didn't somebody tell me about this before?"

Blackstone Trots Fastest Mile This Year To Win Stake At Grand Circuit.

INDIANAPOLIS, June 26—(AP)—Blackstone, driven by Dr. H. M. Parrshall, trotted the fastest mile of the year today in winning a split-heat decision over The Widower in the \$2,400 trotting club stake of the Grand Circuit Harness Race program at the Indiana State Fairgrounds.

Blackstone won the first heat in 2:03 3/4, dropped back to seventh in the second heat and then cut losses with an amazing burst of speed to take the final dash in 1:59 1/2. Blackstone stepped the first quarter of the final heat in 28 3/4 seconds. He showed to 32 1/4 seconds in the second quarter and then stepped up the pace again to reel off the third quarter in 29 1/2 seconds and the last in 29 seconds.

Formerly owned by Spud Hanover, Blackstone was bought by Harry Short, who is the winner of the 24 race, and Adam Volo, driven by Harry Short, was the winner of the 24 race.

Ruffing Pitches Yanks Back Into First Division By 3-1 Score

NEW YORK, June 26—(AP)—New York Yankees salvaged a victory today in the final game of their disastrous western tour. Red Ruffing bested Mel Harder in a hurling duel for a 3-1 decision over the Indians at Cleveland.

The triumph was the first in five games for the world champions and lifted them back into the American League's first division. It gave them a record of four won and nine lost in their trip through the west.

Ruffing and Harder each allowed six hits. Harder giving nothing more potent than three singles—two in the ninth. But he lost the game by giving two to Joe Dimaggio at crucial spots and had to be relieved by Al Smith in the ninth.

Boston's Red Sox cut the Tigers down 3-1 at Detroit, a three-run rally in the ninth inning breaking rookie John Gorsica and young Jim Bagby of Boston.

For eight innings Gorsica limited the Sox to three scattered hits. Bagby was touched for seven hits in as many innings, and walked five men before he was lifted for a pinch hitter in the eighth.

Philadelphia's Athletics turned the Browns out of the first division perch they had gained only last night by defeating them 9-4 at St. Louis.

Chicago's White Sox chubbed three Washington pitchers for 15 hits, but had to come from behind with a two-run ninth-inning rally to defeat the Senators 7-6 and gain an even break in the two-game series at Chicago.

Possibility That Jim Braddock Will Referee

POWERTON LAKES, N. J., June 26—(AP)—The possibility arose today that Jim Braddock, the man who won the world's heavyweight championship from Max Baer might referee Maxie's tussle with Tony Galento in Jersey City next Tuesday night.

Jim's name came up as a candidate for the spot as third man in the ring, and madcap Maxie had no objection. His manager, Andy Hoffman, however, pointed out that Braddock is a light promoter now.

"I think that should automatically be ruled out," he explained. "A promoter shouldn't referee."

GLACE BAY DOWNED

NEW WATERFORD, N. S., June 26—(CP)—John Rosini subdued Glace Bay 4-3 today and became the first pitcher in the Colliery amateur baseball league to accomplish the feat. His five-hit hurling gave New Waterford Straps a tightly-contested victory.

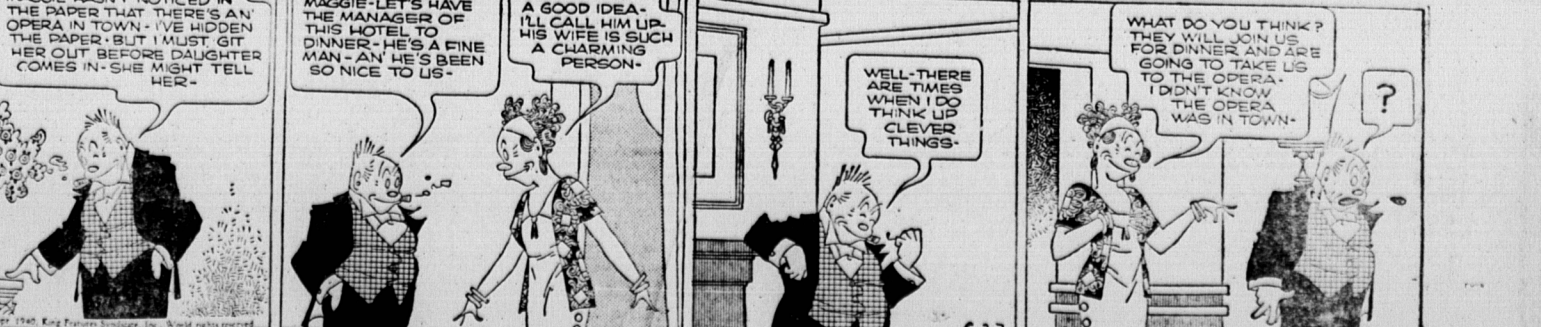
