C. N. R. TO KEEP OUT UNEMPLOYED

TORONTO, Oct. 24.—The Canadian National Railways will aid in the relief of unemployment, this has been announced by the manager of the line, who indicates an increase in freight car equipment, repair forces at Montreal, Riverdale, Quebec and Toronto, instructions were sent out to the general managers yesterday to re-employ men laid off during the last six months, detained in the shops of the Canadian National Railways, the unemployment situation will be further assisted by contracts which have been made to have utilized for repair work the car building plants of the various Canadian equipment companies located at Fort William, Hamilton, Montreal, Amherst and New Glasgow. The management's arrangements are complete and the work will be put under way and should have an immediate effect on the unemployment situation at the various points where the work will be performed.

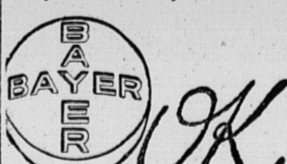

NITTI FAVORS CUT IN ARMS

ROME, Oct. 29.—Ex-Premier Nitti has great hopes of the results of the Washington conference. In an interview today he said: "If President Harding can apply the program of democracy which started when he was elected President, and can make the disarmament conference a success, it will be a greater triumph for him and his country than any military victory possibly could be. Europe's decadence is already begun. The whole of civilization is threatened, and nations arm because their neighbors arm, so I hope and trust that the United States, for her own and the whole world's interests, will apply this disarmament program at the Washington conference."

Premier Bonomi holds a Cabinet council today, when the question of Italian delegation to Washington will be discussed. All lists hitherto given are merely surmises, but the final choice will be made during the present week. The Government is waiting for England and France to decide about sending Lloyd George or Briand before finally publishing its lists, although the Marchese Dellatorre, Foreign Minister, and the Premier, will head the delegation if Lloyd George goes to Washington. Public opinion is in the question of expenditure, 1,000,000 lire, which has already been fixed for the delegation's expenses in Washington. It conceded small, because its representatives cutting a poor figure.

GREEKS WITHOUT CASH, MUST STOP FIGHTING

PARIS, Oct. 24.—The forthcoming visit of Premier Gouraris to Paris and London is taken in influential circles here as a recognition that Greece can no longer carry on the Turkish campaign. Neither nation under the circumstances is able to contribute to such a scheme, and it is predicted here that Athens will see either a change in Government, with Venizelos replacing the Gouraris element, or the abdication of King Constantine, should Premier Briand refuse financial support.

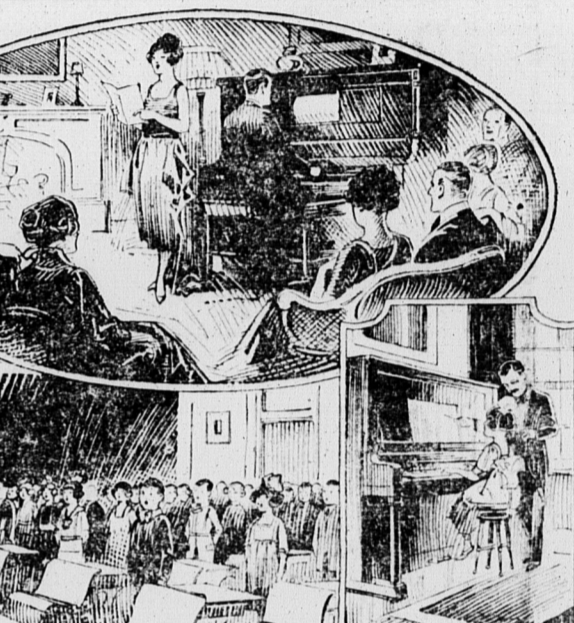
