Beaverbrook Bestows Scholarships On U. N. B. Students

FREDERICTON, Sept. 30—A series of "overseas" scholarships, Brunsford graduates to do post-graduate work each year in Great Britain, has been bestowed upon U. N. B. students by Lord Beaverbrook, its chancellor and long-time benefactor.

The new scholarships provide for the wives of married men, for travel expenses to Britain and back, university tuition and fees, living expenses and extensive educational field trips designed for quickening the spirit of youth and raising the morale of the whole province.

The scholarships, tenable at the University of London, will enable post-graduate work in various fields each year for a maximum of 10 U. N. B. graduates.

Subjects not provided by U. N. B. will be eligible for this award. Dr. Gregg explained that only students of both sexes, the scholarships provide for a year's stay in Britain, but students receiving a certificate of proficiency while attending London University may be permitted to remain two years to qualify for a degree.

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Candidates will be judged on educational attainments, character, and the ability to undertake the duties of leadership and prospective careers for which post-graduate work in Britain would provide the greatest value to the individual and enhance his or her usefulness to the New Brunswick community.
