Premier Receives Interesting Letter

Emphasis on the importance of writing regularly to the troops on active service is placed by Hon. Captain E. W. Robinson, M. L. A., now serving with His Majesty's Forces overseas, in a letter received recently by Premier Campbell. "The work I am doing with the Cape Breton Highlanders is very interesting," Capt. Robinson writes, "and it is along lines somewhat familiar to me in many ways. They are a fine bunch of boys and if I could not be with a Prince Edward Island unit, there is certainly no unit in the Canadian Army's Division, or in fact in the Canadian Army Overseas, that I would sooner serve with."

Capt. Robinson gives an interesting description of the procedure in the British House of Commons, to the Dominion's Gallery of which he was privileged to receive a permanent pass, and where he heard Premier Churchill speak at the special session called after the Japanese attack on Pearl Harbor. He also attended a private meeting of the Parliamentary Association in the House of Commons, to hear Sir Stafford Cripps speak on Soviet Russia. About one-third of the members of the House, he reports, are on active service.

Capt. Robinson concludes as follows: "I would like to express my regrets to all the members of the Legislature at not being with them when they assemble. But I intend to do my best, during my periods on leave of absence, to gather as much information as I possibly can about conditions among the people of all classes over here. Great changes are taking place and I think all agree that the people of Britain are giving sane leadership, not only to the Dominions but to America as well. And much greater happenings appear to be in the not distant future."

"In so far as the Canadians are concerned over here, what they most look for is letters and parcels from home. In this connection, it cannot be too strongly stated that all mail be correctly addressed, parcels not too large, well packed and wrapped. Next in importance is newspapers from their home towns and localities, followed by Canadian and American magazines, which are practically impossible to obtain. Sometimes letters do not arrive, nevertheless the people at home should write regularly and as often as possible.

"I have on different occasions been fortunate enough to meet some Prince Edward Island boys. Today I was more fortunate than usual to have three come to see me. First, Alex Nicholson, and while he was here Major Jack Wright, and Capt. Beckett. The latter two, who came over in the same convoy as we did, will be returning shortly to Canada, and you will no doubt see Jack.

"Prince Edward Islanders away from home surpass the Scotch for clannishness, and you can be assured that we on this occasion enjoyed our get together.

"If there is anything I can do on behalf of the people of Prince Edward Island that would be helpful to them and within my power, I would be glad to serve them to the very best of my ability."

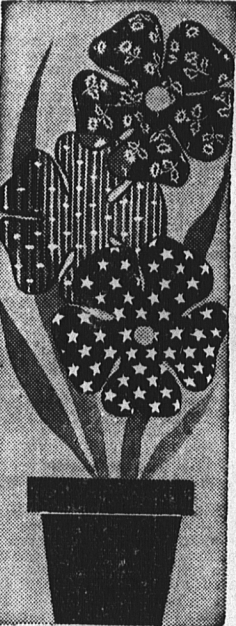

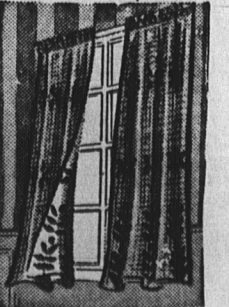
