Enemy Lose Heavily in Recent Fights

PRISONERS ARE TAKEN.

Midshipman Given the Victoria Cross for Life Saving.

BOERS HAVE LOST HEAVILY.

BOTHAVILLE, Nov. 9.—(Special.)—In the heavy fighting since November 6th, the Boers have been badly beaten, losing 23 killed, 30 wounded and 100 prisoners.

BOER GUNS CAPTURED.

Seven of their guns were captured by the British, who lost but slightly.

TRAGEDY AT BELL RIVER.

A telephone message from Montague last night states that Daniel Stewart, of Belle River, was killed in a row Thursday by being hit on the temple with a stick by a relative also named Stewart. The message also states that the unfortunate young man is a son of a widowed mother and is between 35 and 40 years of age. It is alleged the parties attended a plowing frolic during the day and on the same evening while drinking the terribly fatal liquor happened. The perpetrator of the deed when he became aware of the nature of his rash action became frantic with grief.

The call is signed by 300 members and 71 adherents. The Presbytery of Halifax will be asked to hold a meeting at the earliest date to answer the call."

LORD ROSEBERY'S STABLE.

Lord Rosebery who has decided to sever his connection with the turf at all events for a time sent all his horses in training to be sold at Newmarket on Oct 25 and there was a good attendance in the park paddocks among those present being the Prince of Wales two of whose own horses which had been employed to lead Diamond Jubilee in his work being also disposed of. Lord Rosebery's horses comprised a five-year-old, a four-year-old, a three-year-old and 13 two-year-olds. The last named failed to sell. The other seven others fetching 7,305.
