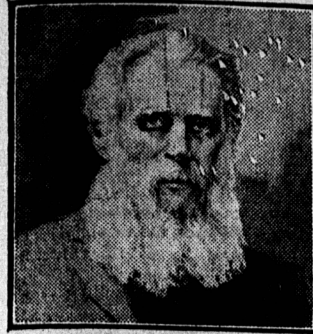

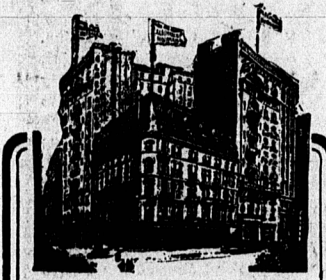

**ISLANDER'S FUNERAL.**—The funeral of the late Robert Bruce Hudson, who died on March 4th, after a very short illness, took place March 6th at Victoria, B. C., where he resided for some years. St. Andrew's Lodge, A. F. & A. M. attended in a body and took the service at the graveside. Many friends were present and beautiful flowers were sent. Mr. Hudson was born at Tryon in 1859 and leaves many relatives and friends on Prince Edward Island.

**SPECIAL SERVICES AT HAZELBROOK.**—On Monday evening, March 22nd the Rev. E. R. Calder began what promises to be a very profitable series of meetings in the Baptist Church. There was a very good attendance and as the speaker dealt with the subject of Revival a good deal of enthusiasm was aroused. The different phases of the subject, The Need, How to begin and What the Revival would mean were dealt with in a masterly way. After the address an inspiring after meeting was held in which many took part. The services will be held every night at 7:30 and a hearty invitation is extended to all.

**FORTY HOURS DEVOTION.**—The Forty Hours Devotion closed in Charlottetown yesterday morning when a Solemn High Mass of Requisition was celebrated by Father J. McLean, assisted by Father Pius MacDonald as deacon, Father Frank McQuaid as sub-deacon, and Father G. J. McLeellan, D. D. Master of Ceremonies. His Lordship the Bishop was present in the Sanctuary. Immediately after Mass the Litany of the Saints was chanted, then the procession of the Most Blessed Sacrament, while the choir sang the "Pange Lingua." Benediction of the Blessed Sacrament was next celebrated, followed by the "Te Deum." Eighteen priests were engaged during Tuesday and Wednesday hearing confessions and during the afternoon 3,882 approached the Sacraments of Penance and the Eucharist. This is 200 greater than any number previously recorded. At Mass yesterday morning and during the time of the "Forty Hours" there were great crowds present in the Cathedral.

**RECONSTRUCTION.**—The marks of the fire of Saturday morning, which destroyed the foundry and blacksmith shop of Messrs Bruce Stewart & Co., Ltd., and damaged the south side of the factory of Mr. M. P. Hogan, are fast disappearing, and the business of both firms is proceeding as usual. All the debris from the building of Bruce Stewart & Co., Ltd., has been cleared away, and the repairs to the Hogan factory will be completed in a day or two. The new foundry and machine shop will be erected, both under the one roof, on a new site about 20 feet to the rear of the machine shop of the firm; the old site will be used as a yard for the present. The new building, which will run north and south, will be 150 feet long and 40 feet wide and will contain new and improved equipment. Construction work will commence at once, and it is expected that the new building will be completed in about six weeks. The change of location is being made as a safeguard against fire and the company has also under consideration the installation of automatic sprinklers of the latest type. These sprinklers would be installed throughout the building, and when the temperature became too hot the water would automatically turn on and an alarm also be rung.

**SPLENDID PRICE PAID FOR FOX SKIN.**—On October 19th, 1914, a very valuable silver black fox pup, owned by the Imperial Silver Black Fox Company, Limited, of Montague, died as the result of an accident received a week or ten days previous, from which blood poisoning developed. The pup was sent to the New York market and realized the handsome figure of \$250. This pup was from a fox born about the beginning of the previous April. It was therefore at the time of its death about six months old, or still a pup. Being a pup, its fur had not yet developed the guard hairs, and its skin was at what is known as unprime, because the pup of the fox is in its full radiant lustre about the end of December or the first of January. Notwithstanding these handicaps, this pup skin from the ranch at Montague realised the large sum mentioned. The dealer who bought the skin informed the representative of the company, Mr. L. M. McKinnon, of Montague, that had the skin been in prime condition and fully developed it would have brought anywhere between one and two thousand dollars, according to what might be sought to match the particular line of sale. Now this individual sale and the price paid under the circumstances mentioned prove conclusively the great value involved in the fox industry. It is up to the fox men themselves to keep the industry prominently before the people at home and abroad. What signifies the spending of a few hundred dollars when something like thirty millions are involved, indicating the tremendous results that may be looked for? **ANNUAL MEETING CONSERVATIVE ASSOCIATION.**—The annual meeting of the Liberal-Conservative Association of Queen's County will be held to-day in the Market Hall, opening at 11 o'clock a.m. No doubt the meeting will be largely attended by delegates from every part of the county. As the train arrangements are such that the stay in Charlottetown will be somewhat limited it is hoped that the delegates will be on hand promptly at the opening hour, eleven o'clock, to permit of a free and full discussion of such matters as shall come before the meeting.

**ANOTHER ISLANDER.**—The following may be of interest to many friends on P. E. I.: Mr. Jack D. Burns of the Medical Staff 30th Battalion, 2nd Contingent, Victoria, B. C., (son of David Burns, Spring Valley, P. E. I.), arrived in Halifax, N. S., on February 18th and embarked for England. The 30th Battalion mobilized at "The Willows Camp," Victoria, B. C., was inspected in January by Major General Sam Hughes and pronounced to be one of the finest of the Canadian regiments. It would be interesting to know how many gallant Islanders have enlisted in other provinces.—L.

**IMPORTANT BILLET.**—The following reference to Mr. Bayfield, son of Mr. and Mrs. Edward Bayfield, Charlottetown, is taken from the Vancouver World: "The numerous friends in Victoria of H. A. Bayfield, former superintendent of dredging in this city, will be gratified to learn of his appointment by the Dominion Government to the important position of principal assistant engineer at Fort Nelson, the terminus of the Hudson Bay Railway. Extensive operations for the improvement of that port are under way and the fact that the Government has enlisted the services of Mr. Bayfield is a tribute to the excellence of that gentleman's record as an ex-

pert dredging engineer. Mr. Bayfield is a graduate of McGill, and not long after leaving that institution he became associated with the Intercolonial Railway. Subsequently he was on the engineering staff of the Great Northern and served with credit also as mechanical superintendent of the Montreal harbor works, one of the most extensive undertakings of its kind on the continent. A few years ago Mr. Bayfield came to this Province and engaged in private practice which he abandoned to enter the service of the Dominion Government. He is a member of the Institute of Mechanical Engineers of Great Britain, the American Institute of Mechanical Engineers and the Canadian Civil Engineers Association. The salary is a very handsome one.

**THE MAILS.**—The boats left Cape Traverse yesterday morning at 6.50, with 47 bags of mail and arrived at Cape Tormentine at 1.15 p. m. The boats left the mainland at 7 a. m., with 69 bags of mail, and arrived at Cape Traverse at 1.20 p. m., the mail reaching here at 3 p. m. Thirty-one bags of paper mail were left behind at Tormentine yesterday. One hundred bags, all Saturday's mail, came over by the Minto and reached here about 9.20 last night. To-day the Stanley will bring over some heavy paper mail that has been at Pictou. It is expected that the ice boats will to-day bring over all Wednesday's and Thursday's mail, clearing everything up on the other side but the 31 bags of paper mail, left behind yesterday and which will have to be left behind again to-day. The mail train left as usual last night at 8.45.
