William, who was a native of Prince Edward Island, is an outstanding figure in the history of Canadian technical and scientific education, having made immense bequests to McGill University and to various agricultural institutes. This was altogether from funds contributed by Sir William that Macdonald College, universally conceded to be one of the most splendidly equipped institutions of its kind, was built, and it is through his generosity that it is enabled to carry on in perpetuity. Sir William Macdonald realized that scientific education was essential for the growth and prosperity of Canada and made all his enormous bequests with that aim in view.

Mr. Tinney, who wins the scholarship awarded for Prince Edward Island, was born in January, 1893, and received his early education at public schools in Massachusetts and Prince Edward Island. He worked on his father's farm until he came to age and then took a two year business course in the Charlottetown Business College. He was first employed by the Experimental Farm at Charlottetown in July 1916. He started to college in October 1916 and in May, 1918, received an honor diploma from the Nova Scotia Agricultural College at Truro. In the autumn of 1918 he entered the Ontario Agricultural College and was graduated from that institution in May, 1920, with the degree of B. S. A. During his college years he was engaged each summer on the Experimental Farm at Charlottetown, and in May, 1920, received a permanent appointment to the position of Assistant Superintendent.

He has shown particular interest in cereals, and has had charge of the cereal work at the Charlottetown farm for several years.

FAREWELL RECEPTION.

On the evening of Monday, Aug. 27, a large number of the people of the Brookfield congregation assembled at the home of Mr. and Mrs. A. D. McPherson, of Brookfield, for the purpose of doing honor to their daughter, Miss Adele McPherson, who was soon to leave for Ottawa, where she had been appointed deaconess in Chalmers' Presbyterian church there.

The earlier part of the evening was pleasantly spent in playing games of various kinds. Not long before the midnight hour the gathering was called to order, and Mr. Chas. E. McDuff, Supt. of the Sunday School, was elected chairman. After having stated the purpose of the gathering, Mr. McDuff called upon the pastor, Rev. R. H. Stavert, who read the following address to Miss Adele McPherson:

"Dear Friend,—For some weeks we, your old friends, of Brookfield and vicinity have been rather expecting that about this season of the year you would be furnishing us with an opportunity to call upon you. It seems only a little while—since we called at your home on the one of this evening. Yes, you will remember that some two years ago when you were setting out upon the Deaconess Training Course, we gathered here to say a parting word and to bid you God-speed. Since that time we have been following your career with interest. From time to time we have heard with pleasure of the splendid success you had met with, not only in your studies, but also in the deaconess work you were carrying on in the congregation of Joggins Mines, in the sister province of Nova Scotia. Regarding your work in that congregation, we were told by Mrs. L. A. Moore, the president of the Maritime W. M. Society, who had visited that field, that she had never known of an instance where the people—both young and old—had become so attached to a worker who had spent some time in

their midst. Mrs. Moore went so far as to say that the lady with whose home you boarded thought so much of you because of your true worth and also because of the splendid work you were doing among the young people that she could not speak of you without weeping. This and other such reports were given out regarding your work in Nova Scotia. And speaking of your work in the Deaconess Training Home, Miss Jean McDonald, the Principal, not long since, among other things, said: "It is a great pleasure to have had Miss Adele McPherson as a student. She has been faithful and has won regard because of her faithfulness in every duty, and for the qualities of head and heart that have made her a good friend and companion in the residential life. She has been appointed to an important position. At the present time, so far as I am aware, there is no Presbyterian Deaconess in Ottawa. It is for Miss McPherson to demonstrate in Chalmers church and presumably to the other congregations what value a deaconess is. It will interest you to know that her record as a student gives us one confidence that she will take up work in such a spirit that it will be greatly done." 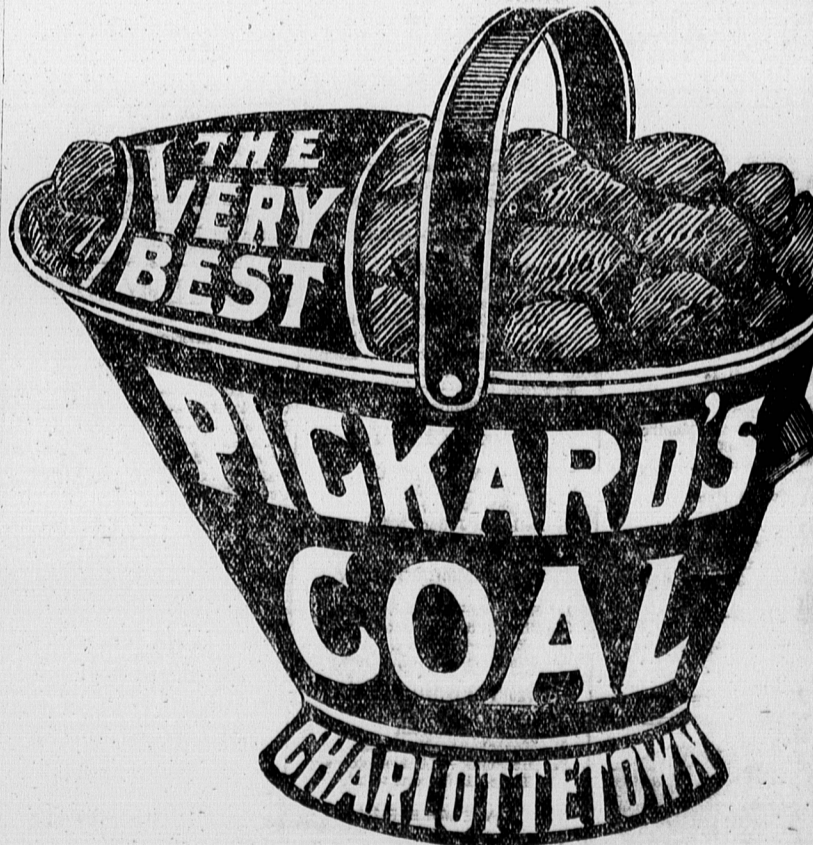
