McLACHLAN TALKS STRIKE

SYDNEY, April 9.—Unless the
miners of Cape Breton obtain re-
dress of alleged serious grievan-
ces they will strike at the first
opportunity, J. B. McLachlan told
a mass meeting in Glace Bay
Sunday afternoon. Mr. McLach-
lan's address dealt mainly with
alleged violations by the Domin-
ion Coal Company of "local con-
tract rates" included in the settle-
ment at the end of the strike of
August 1922. His speech for the
most part was more moderate
than the Secretary of the U.M.W.
generally makes, but he startled
his hearers when he said that
prolonged negotiations with the
company had failed to remedy
the conditions complained of. He
gave notice that in the near future
a delegation will wait upon H. J.
McCann, Assistant General Man-
ager, with an ultimatum in re-
spect to these matters. The
Company still refuses to make ad-
justments, the miners will con-
sider the contract broken and
will hold themselves in readiness
to strike at the first opportunity
he declared.

Merchant Marine
Ships to be Sold
OTTAWA, April 9.—Twenty
seven of the sixty four vessels
comprising the fleet of the Cana-
dian Government Merchant Mar-
ine are to be offered for sale. The
vessels to be disposed of are of
the smaller type more suitable for
coastwise than overseas trade and
yet not adapted structurally for
economic operation through the
Canadian canals. However, a num-
ber have been in operation during
the last two years on the upper
lakes, where they are at present
located. Authority for the dispo-
sal of the ships has been taken by
order in council by the acting
Minister of Railways and Canals;
Hon. George F. Graham, on the
recommendation of President
Thornton of the Canadian Gov-
ernment Merchant Marine, Limi-
ted which is based on a report to
him by the General Manager of
the fleet. The ships are largely of
the 2,800, 3,400 and 4,750 ton
type, but include six vessels of
5,100 tons. The latter are suit-
able for overseas trade but are
in excess of fleet requirements. It
is the intention of the govern-
ment Merchant Marine to adver-
tise these vessels for sale by
public tender. Should satisfactory
offers not be received they will
however be held for disposal by
private sale.

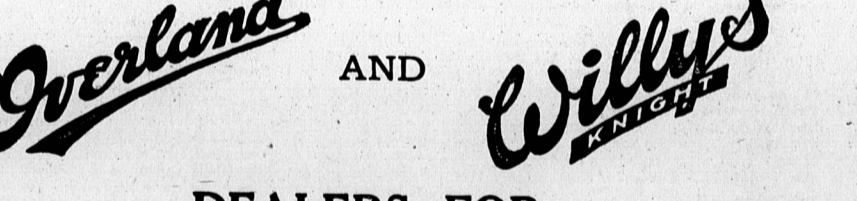
