The January number of the Canadian Geographical Journal more than maintains the high standard, in text, illustrations and general appearance which we have learned to expect in this national publication. A feature of the January number is an autograph letter from His Excellency the Governor General, reproduced in facsimile. Lord Bessborough, himself a member of the Society, and keenly interested in its patriotic and far-reaching efforts to make the resources of the Dominion more widely known, appeals to his fellow-members to show their interest in the Society and its Journal by enlisting their friends and acquaintances as members. That, as Dr. Camshell, the President of the Society, points out in another letter published in the same number, is much the most effective way of strengthening the hands of the Society and enabling it to make the Journal an even bigger and better medium of information.
