Mail for the Boys and Girls Overseas

Eight recent trips a giant 4-engine Lancaster in the Dominion Government's trans-Atlantic service operated by Trans-Canada Air Lines carried for Canada's active forces overseas over 50,000 pounds of mail.

The Canadian Postal Corporation estimates that the average Canadian soldier writes three letters in seven days and receives almost four, which gives some indication of the vast number of letters that must be despatched by all forms of transportation each week.

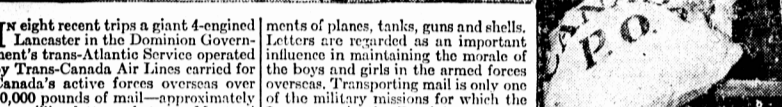
All personnel handling mail consider letters as tremendously valuable factors in the war effort and their safety and forwarding are treated with just as much care and importance as are shipments of planes, tanks, guns and shells.

Letters are regarded as an important influence in maintaining the morale of the boys and girls in the armed forces overseas. Transporting mail is only one of the military missions for which the Lancasters in the Dominion Government service are used.

Upper photo shows the big mail load for one of the flights being placed in the passenger cabin of a Lancaster by security police of the Royal Air Force Transport Command.

The mail bags alongside the aircraft were placed in the nose, as well as in the cargo compartment located in the part of the plane formerly used as the bomb bay.
