By Dr. L. E. G. Davies, pastor of the Sackville United Church, and Harold Cox, a theological student and president of the Mount Allison Students Union.

The funeral service commenced as a group of 24 students from the Choral Society lead a procession down the centre aisle of the hall, followed by the three ministers and the remains, with the casket draped with a Union Jack.

In the funeral address, Dr. Flemington referred to the life of service that the deceased had led, first as a nurse, and particularly with the armed forces, before deciding to devote her attention to the beauties of music.

At the close of the service the student body and faculty members formed a procession through the Town and then formed two lines which extended for almost a quarter of a mile on either side of Lorne Street as the Choral Group, followed by the ministers and the hearse, flanked by the pallbearers passed through as they made their way to the C.N.R. station.

The remains were placed on the noon train for Prince Edward Island where the interment will be made after a funeral service at the family church at Alberton.

Pallbearers for the service included Robert Clarke and Ralph Howe, representing the Veterans' Club; Angus Gilmore and Stanley Miller, representing the Prince Edward Island Club; Graham Murtart and Stirling Colwell representing the freshman class.

Ushers at the service were members of the Veterans' Club, Dr. Flemington and William Turner accompanied the body to Alberton.

S'side May Have New Bank Of Nova Scotia Building

A new Bank of Nova Scotia building may be built in Summerside during the coming year.

Mr. William Hayward, manager of the Summerside branch when asked by the Guardian last night said: "We plan to make some changes or alterations or, if we can find a suitable site, to build a new building but matters are not definite enough yet to say where or when."

Mr. Hayward said he could not name the sites being considered but it was learned reliably that the bank holds an option on the property just west of the present bank property, owned by Miss Addie Green.

There are fourteen on the staff of the bank in Summerside at present and the premises are much too small. There is very little room for expansion on their present property, not sufficient to really alleviate the situation.

Fine Careers Offered In R. C. A. F.

With a view to building a potent nuclear Air Force which may be expanded at a moment's notice, the R.C.A.F. is now launching a province-wide recruiting campaign to fill all the vacancies in its ranks.

During the war, the R.C.A.F. was some 300,000 strong and, although it's new establishment of 12,000 makes it appear small in comparison, it is still several times larger than it was at the outbreak of war in September, 1939.

There are very good reasons, too, why the Air Force will be larger than in pre-war days. Canada's efforts during the war have given her greater importance and greater authority in international affairs.

Canada's young men have very fine careers offered to them in the Royal Canadian Air Force. In the air—and on the ground—careers, and the opportunity to serve Canada are waiting for those who can qualify.

Applicants must be Canadian citizens or British subjects, be of good character, be over 17½ and under 30, except in the case of veterans and skilled tradesmen. The age limit for R.C.A.F. veterans returning to their previous groundcrew trade is 30 plus years of service.

The educational requirements for unskilled applicants is, at present, two years high school junior or senior matriculation, or its equivalent. This gives high school graduates the opportunity to step out of school into a planned career which has great scope.

For those tradesmen who would like to take aircrew training, the opportunity is there for those with sufficient education and motivation. Medical care, dental care, marriage and subsistence allowance, and a generous pension plan are other advantages the man in the services experiences.
