BERLIN MAYOR BOOSTS CITY AS ATTRACTION TO TOURISTS

BERLIN, Dec. 12.—Lord Mayor Gustav Bause has interested himself in the task of restoring Berlin to its pre-war status as a tourist center.

To this end, a municipal travel bureau, which not only interests people into coming to Berlin, but assists them in finding rooms, arranging visits and reserves theatre tickets.

It was he who conceived the idea of erecting a series of fair or exposition buildings on the west end of the city and who pushed the plan for a national sportorium.

The lord mayor also has been engaged in a struggle with the Prussian minister of the interior to permit restaurants, dance halls and other places of amusement to remain open all night.

LONGEVITY OF DOLLS DRIVES

NEW YORK, Dec. 12.—Modernism has brought increased longevity to the dolls that Santa Clause will bring this Christmas. So evident is the doll's health that a once flourishing business devoted to its illa virtually has disappeared. Fifteen years ago there were 250 doll hospitals in New York, while today there are only three. Even the latter have lucrative sidelines.

Most of the twenty million dolls made in America this year have unbreakable heads and bodies plumply stuffed with cotton.

DEATH OF MONA LISA THIEF DRAWS CROWDS TO PICTURE

PARIS, Dec. 12.—Interest in Mona Lisa, the Leonardo da Vinci painting which was stolen years ago from the Louvre, has been intensified by the announcement that the thief died near Varese, Italy.

Curious crowds of visitors stand about the celebrated picture, which now is heavily framed under thick glass. It receives more attention from casual visitors than any other painting in the Louvre.

EGYPTIAN DISPUTE SETTLED WITH ITALY

ROME, Dec. 11.—An Italo Egyptian agreement, reached at Cairo, settling the vexed controversy over the ownership of the Oasis of Jaarub, has received with greatest satisfaction here, as it eliminates in a manner satisfactory to Italy the last territorial problem arising from the Great War. According to the terms of the agreement, Italy gets Jarabub in exchange for a strip of territory on the coast near Solium which is ceded to Egypt.

Jarabub, it is stated here, is extremely important to Italy, because, as it was the point through which caravan traffic between Egypt and Italy's colony at Cyrenaica was obliged to pass, it was an important centre for smuggling arms for rebel Arab tribes into Italy's colonial possessions. It was also an important centre for Senussite propaganda aiming to keep the spirit of revolt alive among the Arab populations.

Jarabub was ceded to Italy by Britain according to the terms of the Milner-Scalafra agreement after the war, but Egypt gained its independence before the agreement could be ratified by the British Parliament.

BREEDING HABITS OF TREE FROGS

Many strange variations in breeding habits and rearing of young characterize the tree frogs of tropical America. A famous South American species makes small pens or nurseries under water, and where the tadpoles are confined, protected from all danger. Another species carries its large eggs on its back until they hatch and the young remains some time afterward. Another species develops pouches in the skin of the back of the female, in which the eggs and young are safely transported.

North American tree frogs possess to a remarkable degree the faculty of changing color by modification of the contents of the pigment cells under the skin, no doubt a provision to enable them to elude their enemies. In winter they bury themselves in the earth or in the decayed wood and dust of old
