THE RADIO

OVERHAULING THE RADIO RECEIVER FOR FALL AND WINTER SERVICE.

(by K. S. Rogers)

Now that the evenings are becoming longer and the cool of fall weather daily expected, you will naturally look more to your Radio Receiver for the evenings entertainment than during the warm mid-summer period.

If you wish to fully enjoy the wonderful programmes now being broadcast from the big American centres of music, you must be just to the Radio Receiver you purchased last year or the year before. Batteries have become weakened through continued use of last winter and have even deteriorated thru standing idle through the months. Vacuum tubes, the heart of the Radio, have perhaps become insensitive to some extent and need to be replaced or treated to somewhat restore their sensitivity. It will pay you in added clarity and volume to put in an entirely new set of tubes, keeping any of the old ones which may work well as spares.

The little "C" battery which looks so insignificant is probably exhausted with its strenuous efforts of last winter in giving you distortion free music and should be replaced with a new one.

Perhaps your grid leak may have become noisy thru the temperature and humidity changes of the Summer and this too should be carefully compared with a new one of approved make.

It will repay you to take down your aerial and carefully polish the corrosion and soot off with fine emery paper, examine all the joints to see that they are still soldered tight. A new aerial of No. 12 enameled copper wire will give you better results this winter than the bare copper or copper-weld you were using last winter.

In buying new tubes and batteries be sure that you purchase only those made by nationally advertised and reputable manufacturers of the highest reputation. Your winter's enjoyment of the Radio can easily be spoiled in seeking to save a few cents in purchasing inferior tubes and batteries.

See that the springs of the sockets for the tubes are in good condition and make firm contact with the tube pins. If they are corroded clean off with a knife or emery paper and if they have lost their tension to any extent bend them up by means of a hook such as a button hook, taking care that you do not bend them too high and break them off.

Be sure to take all tubes out of sockets before disconnecting any battery wires. If you are using charging clips on your storage battery for connections, get a new pair if the old ones show bad acid corrosion. They are a very fruitful source of mysterious noises in many sets.

See that the lightning arrester in good order and not short-circuiting your aerial and ground.

Tourist Traffic To Arctic Circle

MONTREAL, Nov. 2.—To bring the Arctic within the scope of tourist traffic is the object of the Marquis M. N. Degli Abizzi, winter sports director at Lake Placid, who is organizing pack horse trips of thirty days duration next year from the Canadian Pacific Rockies as far north as the Columbia ice fields within the Arctic Circle. "We are going to swim our horses and outfit across the Saskatchewan river and camp near the sources of the Athabasca which empties into Great Slave Lake and thence into the Arctic," the Marquis asserts.

The first of these trips is scheduled between June 23 and July 27 next, leaving from Banff. The Marquis sailed for Europe on the Canadian Pacific liner Montclair today.
