The president, Mr. Marshall McLellan, occupied the chair and in the absence of the secretary, Mr. Emmet Praught, the report of the past year's business was read by the manager, Mr. Leo P. Praught. This showed that there had been an increase in the membership since last year from seventy-two to eighty, while the number of eggs supplied had increased from 22,350 dozen in 1926 to 25,292 dozen in 1927. 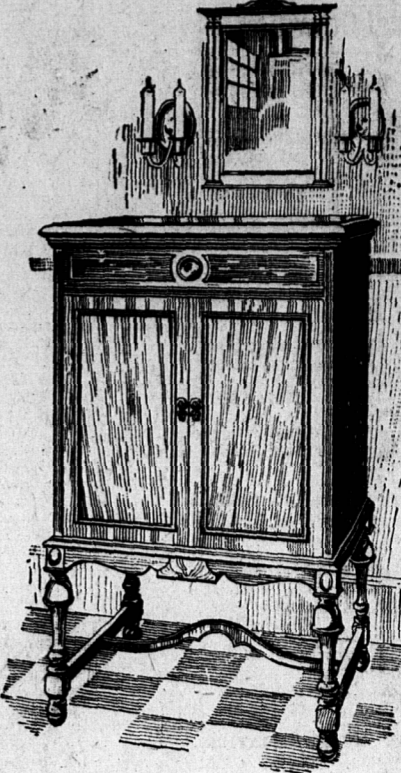
