Anti-Confederationist
Dies At Kentville

KENTVILLE, N.S., June 12 — (CP) — William Rand, 85-year-old retired land surveyor and most articulate of the remaining anti-confederationists, died in hospital here last night.

He was known to Nova Scotia newspaper readers for his fiery attacks on confederation in letters to the editor and for his campaign to release his native province from what he called "Canadian brigandage."

His most frequently-used phrase was: "Where in history did a maritime people submit to the dominion of an inland herd?"

One of the stories told about Rand — although never confirmed by himself — was that he nailed the flag at half-mast on his barn on the diamond jubilee of confederation in 1927.

Holding himself erect despite his age, he was a familiar figure in Western Nova Scotia towns where he made speeches in support of the Free Maritime League, which he described as an underground movement "that intends to make itself heard."

Whether the number sharing his belief that Nova Scotia was "solid" into confederation was appreciable or negligible, no one was ever able to say with authority, but he claimed that "one quarter of the population of Nova Scotia" belonged to the League.

Until his recent illness he was spry and active and managed to peek out his letters to the editor on his own typewriter.

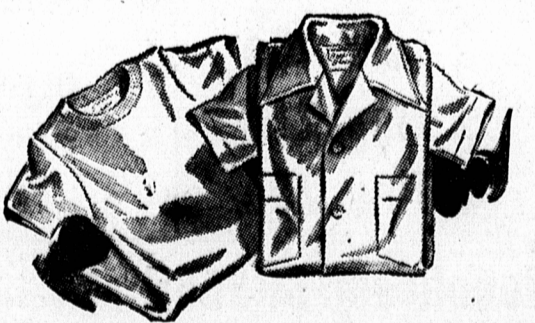
