We have heard that a certain church association, or other organization, appointed a strong committee of men to study its position on the question of baptism as between immersion and sprinkling, pouring, only to have the committee, after most diligent study of the whole question, publish a report completely reversing the position of the church appointing them. This is hardly more surprising than that a "wet" committee should

(Report from Washington, D. C., Dec. 20th, 1931.)

There you have what the people on Prince Edward Island are expecting from, and asking of the who are in authority; something that is even advocated by wet commissioners in a state only legal dry—the enforcement of the law and the teaching of the evil effects of alcohol on the human body. Where better taught than in the schools?

THE UNITED CHURCH OF CANADA

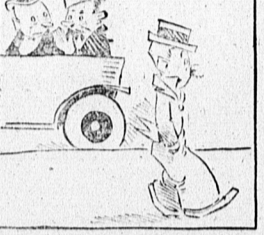
