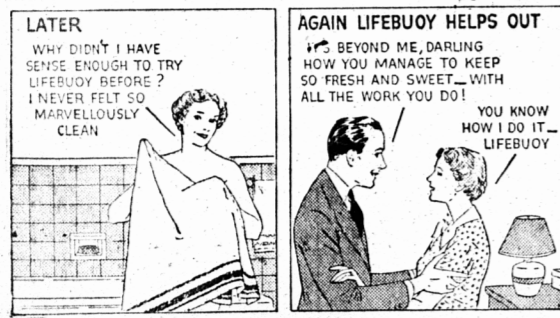

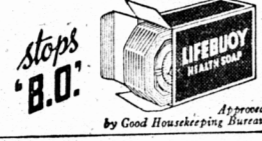

Coming Session Has Big Issues For Parliament

By C. R. Blackburn (Canadian Press Staff Writer) OTTAWA, Jan. 18.—Developments of local political significance which featured the parliamentary recess are expected to be threshed out on the floors of the House of Commons and Senate after parliament opens Jan. 27.

These may include the federal government's relations with the Social Credit administration of Alberta, now the subject of references being heard in the Supreme Court of Canada, new trade policies, the feud between Prime Minister Mackenzie King and his erstwhile supporter, Premier Hepburn of Ontario, unemployment insurance and the defence program.

The third session of the 18th parliament since Confederation will open under the shadow of heavy losses through death which struck impartially at both the Commons and Senate, and at both Liberals and Conservatives.

While the prime minister and a large section of his cabinet travelled in Europe, Ottawa enjoyed a long period of quiet after the closing of the last session of parliament. The ministers attending the coronation of King George VI and Mr. Mackenzie King also visited Germany, Belgium and France.

The fall brought considerable action, however, with the federal government disallowing three acts of the Social Credit administration of Alberta and later developments which resulted in references being made to the supreme court questioning the disallowance power and the constitutionality of three bills by which Alberta sought to deal with banks and newspapers in that province.

Plans of former Prime Minister R. B. Bennett with respect to leadership of the Conservative party and of the official opposition in the House of Commons constituted a subject of lively interest when parliament prorogued last spring.

This was settled when, after a vacation in Europe, Mr. Bennett met his associates in caucus here and it was announced he would continue indefinitely at the head of the party. Since then Mr. Bennett has been unusually active, making many public speeches.

In the Victoria by-election, shortly before polling day, he warned electors they should be prepared to defeat a move he said was planned by the government to abandon British preferences, in order to facilitate the forthcoming trade negotiations between the United Kingdom and United States.

Another matter of wide interest and which will probably have repercussions on the floors of parliament was the further widening of the breach between Mr. Mackenzie King and Mr. Hepburn. Late in November, Mr. Hepburn asked for a licence for the export of surplus power which Ontario would have under new contracts with Quebec producers.

The licence was refused, resulting in a long and acrimonious public correspondence between the two leaders. It is anticipated the question of power export will be subject of a major debate in the Commons as a result of this controversy.

A move to initiate a national scheme of unemployment insurance was launched by the Dominion government, requiring agreement of the provinces on a necessary constitutional amendment. Quebec, Alberta and New Brunswick are the only provinces to withhold their approval. They have demanded further information which, so far as known, has not yet been given.

Question of Trade Late in the year Mr. Mackenzie King announced he would seek a new trade agreement with United States, replacing that which expires at the end of 1938. Negotiations are expected to run concurrently with those between United Kingdom and United States. No official comment has come from the government as to whether Canada will abandon some preferences on the United Kingdom market to facilitate negotiations between that country and the United States.

Controversy Rages Over Paintings

By Edwin S. Johnson Canadian Press Staff Writer LONDON, January 19.—(CP)—Four small paintings, each about eight inches square, have suddenly become a magnet to the thousands who visit the National Gallery weekly to browse among its wealth of art treasures.

The pictures, acquired by the gallery directors last fall, were attributed to the great later-renaissance Italian painter, Giorgione. One, although the name cost the nation \$15,000 (\$70,000), the purchase was hailed at first as a masterpiece, for exclusive critics have long contended there are less than a dozen genuine works by the master in existence.

But a storm of controversy was unleashed following a statement by Dr. G. M. Richter, regarded as one of the greatest authorities on Giorgione, that the four pictures are actually the work of Andrea Previali, a minor master. An authentic Previali can be bought today for about \$200.

On the other hand, Sir Kenneth Clark, Director of the National Gallery, supported by the trustees, declared no hand but Giorgione's could have painted the panels.

12,000 Mile Trip By Motor Described By W.M. Jenkins

The people of Chelton were given a rare treat on Thursday evening of last week, when Mr. W. M. Jenkins of Lower Bedouque addressed them in the school room on his recent trip across Canada.

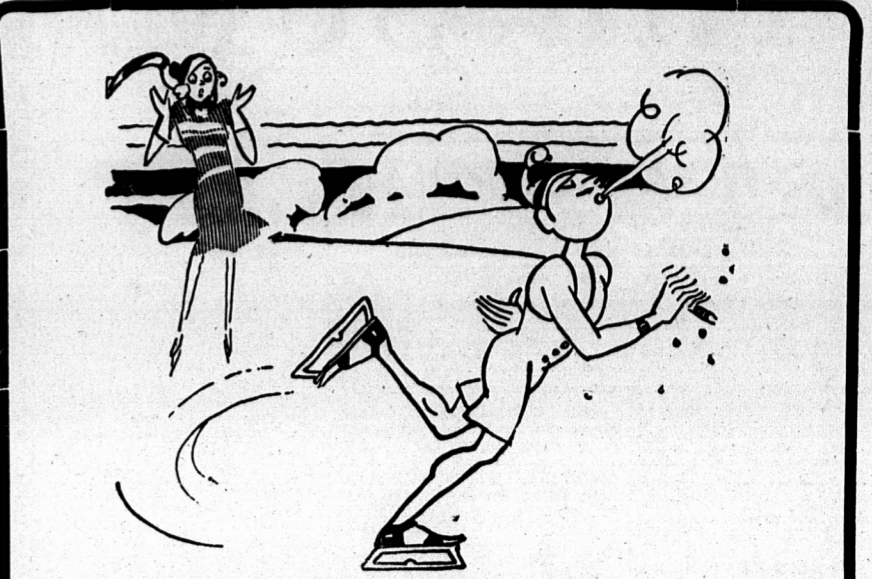
There was a good attendance and the best of order prevailed. Mr. Jenkins stated at the outset that he did not see the need of saying anything about the Maritimes as they were already well-known to his hearers, so took his audience along to old Quebec, of which he painted a picture of this old historic city, the never-changing customs of its people, its cathedrals and shrines, and historic places.

The speaker and party also visited the famous Dionne Quints. He did not visit them, he declared, because of any special interest he had in the affair, but just wanted to be able to say when he got back home that he saw the Quints. His better half, however, told later in the evening that for a time she lost her husband, and after a rather anxious hunt finally found him back at the Quints trying to get another peep.

From here he went on to Ottawa, Toronto, and other Canadian cities and points of interest, picturing all the while the beauty spots and customs of the people as he moved along. Then on to the Prairie Provinces and their chief cities. In Calgary they encountered heavy rain, where they were held up for several days. Here rain was such a novelty that much of the population turned out to dance in the mud puddles.

In describing the prairie roads after a rain, the speaker humorously compared them to the new Chelton road last fall.
