Britain Thinking Of Shipping In Post-War Terms

LONDON, March 28—(CP)—Britain is thinking about her shipping in post-war terms and what the re-building of her mercantile marine and its trade will mean in the plan for a better nation.

Britain's ships and their commerce are her life-blood. The men who build them, the ships who sail them have performed during the war a job as vital as that of the R.A.F. in the battle of Britain, the world's greatest maritime nation, entered the war with some 18,000,000 tons of merchant shipping of all types. She will emerge from the war with much more as a result of the U-boat war, and probably with new com-

petitors in the sea-lanes, such as the United States which has the greatest merchant marine of all time.

But when that period is over, ships sailing under varied flags will gradually come to compete with one another for existing trade.

Just as it will be with other departments of post-war commercial organization, the successful restoration of the shipping industry for mutual benefit will depend on international cooperation.

When the war ends, Britain possibly could replace much of her lost tonnage from the surplus that the United States will have. But those ships built for war purposes may not be regarded as suitable for peace-time commerce.

Some ship-owners have indicated an interest in civil aviation which they believe they might play a complete role because of their experience in the problems of transportation.

The part of aviation in post-war commerce may influence and modify their shipping plans.

Maritime Tankmen Hand Out Pounding To Nazi-Held Town

WITNESS THE CANADIAN CORPS IN ITALY, March 28—(CP)—The Germans based around the Italian town of Tollo must know the wine cellars well by now.

For its size, this town about four miles inland from the Adriatic Sea probably has taken as many shells as any German-held town on the Adriatic battle front.

The most concentrated lacing Tollo received came from the 76 MM. guns of an eastern Canadian armor regiment's tanks. For a little more than 90 seconds every gun in the regiment concentrated on a cross-roads in the town and when the cease-fire sounded, smoke from more than 700 shells clouded the valley.

That was one of the best shows I have ever seen," messaged an excited artillery officer who directed the fire. Another observer watched from an observation post said houses crumbled like match boxes.

Squadrons commanded by Major T. H. Lane, Halifax, H. G. Kierstead, Saint John, N.B., and P. M. Blanchet, Rothesay, N.B., took part in the shoot which was in charge of the regiment's second-in-command, Maj. G.R.H. Ross, Halifax.

While the acting brigade commander and other senior officers watched from a tank, Lieut. G.M. Miller, London, Ont., the signal officer, talked to an observer passing directions back to Ross who relayed them to the tanks.

Each squadron ranged and was the target with a minimum number of shots. Then Ross called for the regiment to fire and in a clear, non-dramatic calm like some tremendous earthquake.

Shells followed one another with amazing rapidity and soon the tanks were clouded by their own smoke. As suddenly as it began, the firing ceased and the shoot was over except for the job of clearing away shell cases and cleaning guns.

The previous night this regiment had been in the centre of a German counter-battery barrage and although no one was injured, shells fell close enough to be uncomfortable. The troopers felt they had more than evened the score by the time they fired their 700 rounds.
