

Detroit Red Wings Shut Out N. Y. 7-0 To Bolster League Lead

DETROIT, Nov. 6 (AP)—Detroit Red Wings tonight massacred New York Rangers 7-0 to bolster their lead in the National Hockey League race. A crowd of 12,254 saw goalie Harry Lumley of Detroit get his second shutout of the season.

The Detroiters, who turned in a lopsided 6-1 win over the Rangers in their only other meeting thus far in the N. H. L. campaign, had things pretty much their own way tonight.

Three of the Red Wings goals came while Rangers were sitting out penalties.

The go-ahead Detroiters gave New York goalie Chuck Rayner a bad night, as he racked up 23 saves, 16 of them in the second period.

New York's weak attack was reflected in the second and third periods when Lumley had only four saves in each. He had a total of only 14 for the night.

TORONTO 4, CHICAGO 2

CHICAGO, Nov. 6 (AP)—The Toronto Maple Leafs kept within a game of National Hockey League leading Detroit tonight by defeating the Chicago Black Hawks 4-2 before 17,008 fans.

The defeat snapped Chicago's three-game winning streak. Hawks led on two separate occasions and there was a tight battle between Bob Goldham and Toronto's Gus Morton to thrill the crowd, largest of the season so far here.

What actually was the winning goal was at 14:30 of the second period when Howie Meeker fired one home while Chicago was short-handed because of a tripping penalty on Bill Gadsby. A fourth or clincher goal occurred at 17:49 of the final period when Joe Klukay tipped one into a corner.

TORONTO, Nov. 6 (CP)—Toronto Maple Leafs did the most shutout of the night but Detroit Red Wings shot more accurately and came through with a 4-3 National Hockey League victory which ended the joint tenure of the two clubs in first place in the league standing.

Except in the opening minutes, the Leafs dominated the territorial play. They outshot the Red Wings 34 to 22. But when it came to scoring, the Red Wings held command.

Ezinicki flattened Jim McFadden of the Leafs with a crushing body-check which sent the Detroit player to the dressing room in the second period with a slight concussion. McFadden didn't get back into the game and when his teammates left by plane last night for Detroit, he stayed behind and will return later. Doctors said the injury was not serious but they felt he should stay here overnight.

The victory evened the score between the two teams. The Leafs beat the Red Wings 5-1 in their first meeting of this season at Detroit. It was Toronto's second loss this season.

With the exception of the opening game of the series, which the Saints won by the lopsided score of 17-0, the series has been a close one, with the Welshmen coming back from their initial disastrous defeat as a greatly improved squad to battle the Saints to a scoreless deadlock in the second game, and change what looked like an easy series for the Saints, into one that has all the prospects of being anybody's championship from here on.

Today's encounter should be one that will display plenty of action and smart rugby and might well come up with one of the most evenly matched struggles of the season, and there will no doubt be a host of fans and followers crowding the stands and sidelines to witness the boys in action.

IN THE CORNER

Well, one of the closest N.B.-P.E.I. intercollegiate rugby championship series to be witnessed for a good number of years was concluded over the Sackville, N.B. gridiron Saturday afternoon when the University of New Brunswick defeated by a 2-2 deadlock in the final game of the series to give the Mounties the twin-Province title and the right to meet the Nova Scotia champions, Acadia Axemen, for the Maritime intercollegiate title at Truro, N.S. next Saturday in a sudden death encounter.

The tie game gave the Mount Allison crew a total of five points to overshadow the local Saint Dunstan's University aggregation by one point in the home and home total point series to leave the defending champions in second place spot, while the U.N.B. rugbyists finished third with a total of three points.

As was the case in three of the total six games played between the three squads, it was the field goals on penalty kicks that decided the issue, with both Mount A. and U.N.B. capitalizing on free kicks in the opening half to account for their scoring, the former getting the first to run the score to 2-0 and the latter also booting the second place spot, while the U.N.B. rugbyists finished third with a total of three points.

Although most everyone who has been following the series doesn't need to be reminded of the closeness of it all the way through, we would nevertheless like to point out one or two features here about the tussles that might enlighten those who are interested but were not in a position to follow the events as closely as they would have liked.

Probably the one feature that illustrates the closeness of all the three teams in the series better than any other is the fact that in the total of six games played, there were only three touchdowns scored in the entire series, with the balance of the scoring either on penalty kick field goals, which gives one a pretty good idea of the evenly matched nature of all three entries.

Mount A. scored a 2-0 victory over Saints by virtue of a penalty kick in the opening game of the series, while Saints reversed the decision in their second meeting by the same method, both squads losing on their home ground. U.N.B. and Saints battled it out to tie scores in both their meetings, the first being a scoreless tie at Fredericton and the second a 3-3 deadlock here over the S.D.U. gridiron. In the U.N.B. vs. Mount A. contests, the latter scored a 3-0 victory over U.N.B. at Fredericton, with of course the final meeting at Sackville on Saturday ending in a 2-2 draw.

Another pronounced feature in the series, which might be noticed by the reader in the above review of the games, is the fact that not one of the three teams scored a clear cut victory on their home fields, with the only three actual victories, Mount A. against Saints, Saints against Mounties, and Mount A. against U.N.B., all being won on foreign soil.

In a brief chat over the phone last night, Professor Gordon Bennett of Prince of Wales College, who went over from here Saturday to referee the final encounter of the series, stated that following Saturday's game he was talking to Bob MacLaughlin, coach of the U.N.B. squad, who stated "I still think that the best team in the series is back on the Island". This is a feather in the cap for the retiring champions, especially when it comes from the coach of one of their foremost opponents, and is mentioned here so that credit is given where it is justly due.

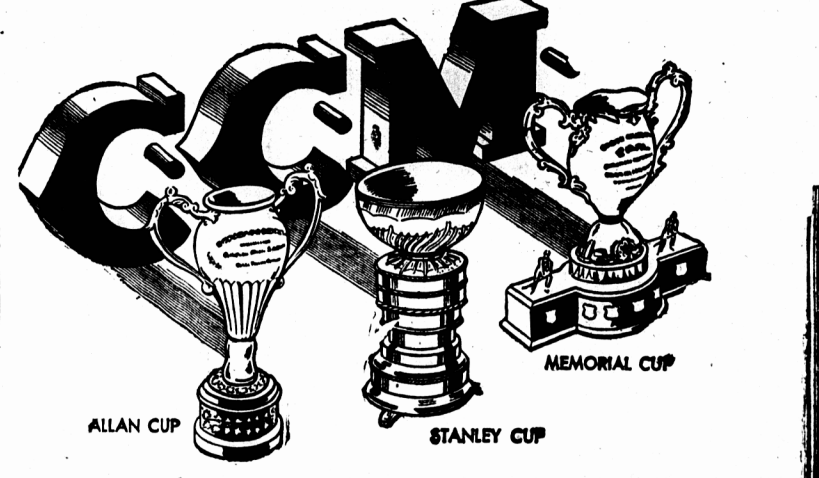
The second half was less exciting, with the ball juggling from team to team with no side making great advances.
