Primed and ready for the fray, Walter Lawlor sent his Intermediate Abegweits through their final practice yesterday evening in preparation for their game tonight against the New Waterford squad, champions of Cape Breton Island and as the squad skated off the ice, the coach Lawlor was confident that tonight his charges would give a good account of themselves in the opening game of the Maritime semi-final play-downs. The series is a two-game total-goal affair with the winner meeting the South Shore champions in the next round.

And as the confident Abegweits completed their training an equally confident band of Cape Bretoners arrived quietly in the city also ready for the fray. Led by manager Roy Cummings and a band of 14 players, also Duncan McEachern, A. McKenzie, C. Darragh, A. McNamara and L. Campbell all supporters of the team, the Cape Breton champions had little to say on the outcome but although expecting the stiffest kind of battle were also confident of being returned the winners.

The New Waterford team are a husky looking bunch of boys. They boast of two capable goalies a strong hard-checking defence and five lines of fast-skating forwards. The team is the pick of a New Waterford league and are reputed to be an evenly balanced outfit. They succeeded Glouce Bay, last year's Intermediate champions of Cape Breton and incidentally the team that last year eliminated them from the play-downs. Fans who have seen them play this season say they are better than last year's Bay squad and the Bay team last year were good enough to take the Maritime crown.

But irrespective of the conjectures going the rounds, the ultimate winners, it will have to be fought out on the Forum ice space tonight. It looks like a hard, close struggle between two squads of champions and will turn out to be a fight to the finish. Cape Breton teams never know when they are beaten; Abegweits are always in for the aggressive spirit they display at Truro they should be a crowd thriller and pleaser right from the opening whistle.

Indications point to a big crowd for tonight's battle. Fans are talking freely of the encounter as they weigh the chances of the locals to continue in the hunt for the Maritime title and it appears as if the Abegweits will be lucky in support at tonight's encounter.

The game will get underway at 8:15 sharp. Both teams are on the spot of battle and the Forum promises no delay in this respect. Fans are therefore reminded to be in their seats early. Advance ticket sale has been brisk. Manager Archer stated last night and it looks like a real old-time hockey game for tonight's Maritime play-down.

An indication of how serious New Waterford is taking the game can be seen by the fact that yesterday while waiting at Truro they held a workout on Truro ice to get some of the stiffness out of their legs after their long train ride. Manager Cummings and members of the team appreciate the fact of the Truro management very much as it was both thoughtful and timely.

Snell tops C.B.H.L. scorers

SYDNEY, N.S., Feb. 26—(CP)—With the Cape Breton Senior Amateur Hockey Circuit schedule completed and Sydney Millionaires and Glouce Bay Miners preparing to play off for the title, the fans sat back tonight and thumbed the record books.

George Jug Snell, youthful pivot who came to the Millionaires from the University of Manitoba, rolled up the highest individual scoring ever recorded in Cape Breton senior hockey. His mark for the season was 37 goals and 27 assists for 63 points.

Right winger Johnny McCreedy, a Winnipegper and late of Kirklain Lake, posted 31 goals and 26 assists for 57 points. Another Winnipegper, Steve Lat'ski, had 53 points composed of 24 goals and 29 assists.

Jack Atchison, another Millionaire with Winnipeg as his home town finished with 33 goals and 19 assists for 52 points. Jim Williams, a Cape Bretoner, was third with 47 points, 24 goals and 23 assists. He was dropped by Sydney and picked up by the North Sydney Victorias, was good for 29 goals and 21 assists, 50 points.

Bad man of the league was Mel Snowden, a Millaire defenceman from Winnipeg. He spent 78 minutes of his playing time in the penalty box.

Millie Kalmuck Trots Fastest Heat Of Season In Yesterday's Ice Racing

The fastest quarter mile of the season was trotted yesterday as Willard Kelly's fast mare, Millie Kalmuck, trotted the second heat of the free-for-all trot in 30 seconds after winning the first heat by half a length from Lusty Frisco in 30-1-4 seconds. It was the big thrill of a good afternoon's racing over a fast track with Leland and Raymond Budlong winning the other two classes on the card, the Class A Pace and three year old respectively.

Making her first start of the season, Millie Kalmuck had as opposition Lusty Frisco and June Evans and the fast time made was no great surprise. Millie went away in front the first time down and 50 yards from the wire the two horses were very close. Millie however had half a length to the good coming under the wire with Lusty Frisco trotting very fast on the inside being second and June Evans at the Frisco horse's head.

In the second heat the three trotters got away in a line with Lusty on the inside, Millie next and June Evans on the outside. At the eighth pole they were still in a line across the track but from there on Kalmuck gradually went to the front with Lusty again in the runner up position and June Evans third.

Leland owned by Neil McKinnon of Mt. Herbert caused an upset by winning the Class A Pace from the favored Gippy K. After placing second in the first heat, fastest time of this race was 33 seconds Leland going the last two quarters in perfect time. They got away to a perfect start with Gippy K. going right to the front followed by Leland and Princess Kalmuck. As they paced under the wire Gippy K. was a length in front with Leland second and Princess Kalmuck making her first start of the season a close third.

Leland went away on high for the second heat and led all the way. Princess Kalmuck, making her first start of the season a close third. It was much the same story in the final heat. Leland pacing steadily was away in front again with Gippy K. second and Princess Kalmuck third. The horses positions being unchanged from wire to wire.

In the three-year-old class Raymond Budlong hung up a 1-1-1 summary proving far steeper than the other three horses in the field. They got away on the first score the first heat. All horses made

breaks at the eighth with the exception of Raymond Budlong who won by two lengths over Miss Brewer; Dorothy P. was third and Wait N'See a real promising looking trotter winding up fourth.

Raymond again went to the front at the start of the second heat and was never headed. Dorothy P. was second with Miss Brewer third and Wait N'See fourth.

The third heat was the closest of the race. Raymond Budlong was in front at the eighth followed by Miss Brewer, Wait N'See and Dorothy P. Here both Budlong and Brewer jumped it off with Wait N'See going to the front, 50 yards from the wire Wait N'See seemed like a certain winner of the heat but here he made a break with Raymond Budlong who got back on the trot beating him under the wire by a head. Miss Brewer was third with Dorothy P. a victim of breaks fourth.

Next Saturday a real program is in the offing with several classes scheduled in addition to the elimination race to decide the trotter or pacer who will meet the Eastern Driving Club's champion Guy Britton in the big match race next Wednesday.
