International Team matches Are mooted

Buenos Aires, Oct. 23 (AP)—Talk of international team matches with the United States, goal of the Argentine Golf Association for nearly a decade, has been revived since the arrival of Sam Snead and Jimmy Demaret.

With the Ryder Cup matches between the United States and Great Britain apparently blocked for the duration of the war, local officials are attempting to initiate an annual eight-men-to-a-side competition between the two American nations in 1942. The big obstacle has been and still is a lack of money, but the financial prospects are brighter than ever today.

There is a "good neighbor" angle involved, too. North American businessmen who have spent years to believe there is no better way to foster good relations with Argentina than on the golf course. For this reason they are hopeful of attracting both governments' support for the team plan.

While there are no public links here now, the city of Buenos Aires is considering building one on a new park tract. Argentina's ruling class can be found driving, pitching and putting nearly every day the year around and even nonplayers follow the golfing news with interest.

Buenos Aires newspapers publish complete accounts of major golf tournaments in the United States and the accomplishments of the leading performers are well known. Snead and Demaret are here to compete in the National Open.

Kelly Included In Four Springfield Players To Start Season With Amerks

PORT ARTHUR, Oct. 23 (CP)—Manager Mervyn (Red) Dutton probably will start his re-built New York Americans in the National Hockey League campaign with four players from Springfield.

Eddie Shore, Springfield Indians, in addition to right winger Mel Hill, formerly with Boston Bruins, world's champion in 1937, and Harry Watson, 18 year old Saskatchewan left winger.

The American League squad broke their training camp here this week, leaving centres Kelly, former star of Detroit Red Wing National League team, Fred Modell and Peters, both with Montreal Royals, Eastern Canada junior champions last spring, and



Watson from the Saskatoon Junior Quakers will form a new "lid line" in the N. H. L. this season if they make the grade.

Dutton revealed he hasn't figured centre Murray Armstrong in his plans for Americans early campaign. Armstrong, troubled with an old back injury isn't expected to get into the lineup until later in the season as "im not taking any chances with Murray's back," said Dutton.

Meanwhile Kelly, Lorne Carr and Buzz Boll have been teamed together for another forward line with Thurrier, 24 year old French-Canadian from Granby, Que., has been selected to pivot left wing Harvey Jackson and right wing Hill on the line.

Tommy Anderson will be used to solve Americans' blue line problem. He will work with Wilf Field, Pat Egan and Andy Branigan, all with Americans, at the close of the 1940-41 season.

In goal Earl Robertson who moved from Montreal to Springfield last season to make way for Charlie Rayner, brilliant Winnipeg netminder, will be given a chance to make a comeback with his former mates. Rayner at present is in Winnipeg.

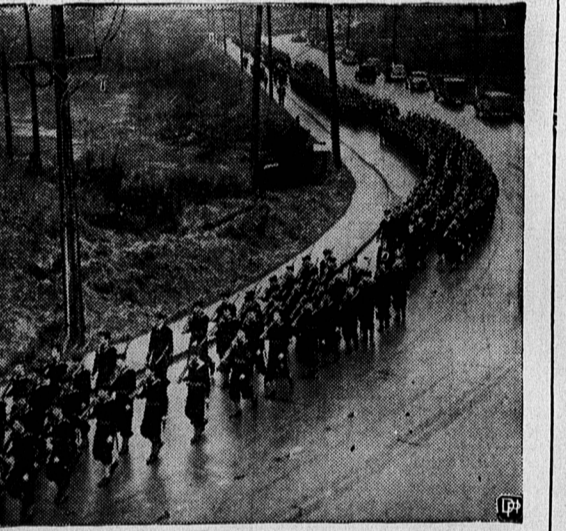
Possibility Of Bouchard Gaining Defence Berth With Dick Irvin's Canadiens

Famous Mascot Of Irish Regiment Dies at Debert

DEBERT CAMP, N.S., Oct. 23 (CP)—Captain Kilkenny, famed mascot of the Irish Regiment of Canada and only dog entitled to wear the kilts of Saffron, died today and was buried today with full military honors.

The big Irish Wolfhound, best known mascot in the Canadian Army, had been ailing for weeks. Even the attentions of a specialist from Halifax couldn't cure him.

Captain Kilkenny, pure-bred descendant of an ancient line of Royal Irish hounds, was officially ranked as a private in the army. He had a regimental number, B-31499.

Like the other privates, he suffered all inspections and other routine army exercises. He never day was known to miss one, until illness laid him low. When the Toronto Irish marched the 124 miles from Montreal to Three Rivers, Que., he walked all the way, though his feet were blistered at the end of the five-day hike.

He left one of his sons—Pte McGinnis—as his successor.

THE STORY OF THE "JAMES B. DUFFUS"

The barque "James B. Duffus", 672 tons, was built in Yarmouth, N.S. in 1864. On her first voyage, she lost the mate and ever after she had the reputation of being haunted.

Crews were hard to keep since, they said, a strange man walked the decks. Dishes would rattle and lights go out for no reason.

One story, typical of many, was that one stormy night in mid-Atlantic, the mate woke to find himself unaccountably in the middle of his cabin floor. Through the open door he could see the owner quietly reading his Bible. Mate and owner together searched the ship. As they reached the far side of an empty cabin, something struck the wall a terrific blow and loud laughter mocked them. The mystery of the ship was never explained and her end is not recorded.

Leafs well Stacked with Right wingers

ST. CATHARINES, Ont., Oct. 23 (CP)—Toronto Maple Leafs have five right-wingers besides Centre Drillon in their National Hockey League training camp here and it goes without saying that Coach Hap Day would be happy if just two of them had that uncanny scoring punch of the Moncton, N. B. homebred.

The debutant Drillon is still one of the most prolific scorers in the game. Injuries last year curtailed his usefulness but if he proves this season he is bound to be up among the top marksmen.

Drillon is expected to benefit considerably from what started out as an emergency measure and later became a permanent thing. That is a switch which brings Nick Metz to play alongside Drillon and Syl Apps in the place of Bob Davidson.

The other right wingers at camp are Ron Metz, brother of Nick, Gus Marker, Jimmy McCreedy, Harry Frost and Peanut O'Flaherty. Metz, a sophomore in pro ranks, and the veteran Marker were with the team last year.

McCreedy played with Sydney Millionaires, Eastern Canada senior amateur champions, last year. Frost was obtained from Hershey of the American League for a trial, and O'Flaherty, signed a year ago by the Leafs, was loaned to New York Americans last year.
