THE MARITIME BOARD OF TRADE

Adopts Resolutions Re Transportation and Express Charges, Cold Storage on Steamers and Export of Pulpwood.

St. JOHN, August 21—(Special)—The annual meeting of the Maritime Board of Trade opened here this morning. There are a large number of delegates in attendance and much business has been put through. A resolution introduced by Hon. G. George E. Hughes of Charlottetown and seconded by Father Burke was passed declaring that the steamers subsidized between Prince Edward Island, Newfoundland and Sydney should be equipped with cold storage facilities. A resolution with the same mover and seconded was with reference to the alleged excessive express rates on the Government road in Prince Edward Island. This was also passed unanimously. A resolution was passed asking the prohibition of the export of pulpwood, and the question of technical education was also discussed at some length. Another session will be held tomorrow morning.

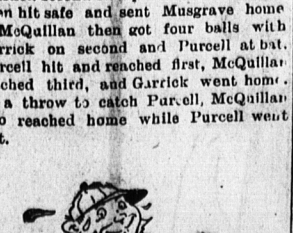
Summerside Boys Make Home Team Hop Lively—Good Clean Sport—Interesting Game For Spectator Charlottetown Wins.

It was a very exciting game in which every player was forced to do his best to see his team win. The game started about 2:30 and there was no delay until the finish about 4:15. The day was excellent and the grounds were well attended, to being roped off and a long net was placed behind the catcher to serve as a backdrop. 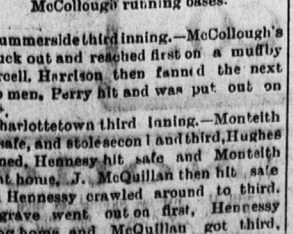
McMurdo waiting for four balls.

SCOTTISH SPORTS GREAT SUCCESS

Splendid Day at Georgetown--Fine Program of Sports--The Governor General Received--Address. An Immense Crowd Well Satisfied

The Caledonia Club of this Province were certainly favored with fine weather, all the more acceptable after a night of rain, for the holding of their annual gathering and athletic sports, which took place at Georgetown yesterday. Georgetown was in holiday attire for the occasion and for the expected visit of the Governor General and party. Flags were flying from every point of vantage and from the cruiser Canada and other craft in the harbor, while a very fine arch of welcome spanned the street just opposite the entrance to the grounds where the gathering was held. By eleven o'clock the trains from the different parts of the Province began to arrive at Georgetown, each heavily loaded. People came from every district and a large contingent from Charlottetown and the intervening stations accompanied the members of the C.I. don't Club, who wore their plaids and bonnets and were headed by their pipers and Worth's Band as they marched from the station to the grounds. Added to the crowd brought by the trains were many people who drove from the country round about and by the time the games were called there was a large assemblage. About half past two in the afternoon the Governor General and his party arrived on the ground and were greeted with three rousing cheers. His Excellency was then presented with an address from the Caledonian Club, to which he made a particularly happy reply. Space forbids the publication of this address which is somewhat lengthy, in this issue. An address was also presented on behalf of the Town of Georgetown, signed by G. A. Aitken, Chairman of the Town Council and to this also His Excellency made a suitable reply. After this the distinguished visitors looked on while the boys of the Highland Brigade were drilled, and they also witnessed an exhibition of Scotch dancing and the tug of war, after which they went on board the Minto, which had arrived in Georgetown harbor during the afternoon. The program of sports was continued at the grounds and at its conclusion the prizes were distributed amid much enthusiasm. This brought to a close one of the most enjoyable and successful Scottish gatherings of recent years. The arrangement made by the various committees resulted in every detail working out to perfection and the officers of the Caledonian Club are to be congratulated on their management. All the people were safely and without undue loss of time got away on their different special trains and reached their homes in good time. The special for Charlottetown, with its big crowd of excursionists and the Club members as well as the Boys' Highland Brigade and the Band arrived here shortly after nine o'clock last night. A procession was formed and headed by the Band and the pipers, marched to the Club Rooms on Queen Street, where all were dispersed to the music of Auld Lang Syne.

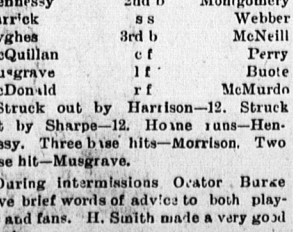

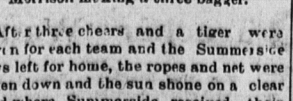

Hughes, Charlottetown (P. E. I.). Capt. Joseph Read, of Summerside and Mr. Frowse, of Montague (P. E. I.), will arrive this morning. The delegates from Halifax and Sydney and also the majority of the New Brunswick delegates will arrive this morning. H. C. Creed, of Halifax, the veteran secretary of the organization, has been in the city since Monday preparing for the meeting. The first session to day will be taken up mainly with matters of routine. NEW YORK RICH SELLING AUTOS

Rich Man's Panic in Wall Street Forces Sales and Cancelling of Orders Amounting to Fifteen Millions.

New York Aug 21.—(Special) More than two thousand New Yorkers, some of them ranking as millionaires, have sold their automobiles within the last few weeks. Almost as many more have cancelled orders for new machines. These automobiles represent a total cost of over fifteen millions of dollars. The rich man's panic in Wall Street has made the trouble. Every dealer in high priced machines American or imported has stories to tell of orders cancelled by New Yorkers who until recently were generally supposed to be rich enough to buy anything they desired.
