OUR OTTAWA LETTER

(Continued from Page Four.)

A feature of the session of special interest to Prince Edward Island is the speech of Mr. Donald Nicholson, the junior representative of Queen's in the Commons. Mr. Nicholson is one of the most popular members in the House, and his friends are not all on the Speaker's Right either. He speaks all too seldom, but when he does speak he always says something of interest and never fails to get the ear of the House. His speech the other night consumed about an hour, and was followed with the closest attention. He did not indulge in any flights of oratory over the war and the bravery of the boys who are doing their bit in the trenches, and with the big guns, nor did he declaim against the infidelity of the Liberals, because of their violation of the truce arranged at the beginning of the conflict. What he did do was to place before the House conditions in Prince Edward Island, to lay bare the substantial progress his native province had made in its still making despite the war. He showed what is being done to develop the natural resources of the province as a consequence of the assistance received from the present Government, and spoke of the largely increased returns from agriculture and allied interests which must follow the reconstruction of the country. He also dealt with the matter of ship-building on the Island, an industry which flourished there some years ago, and expressed the hope that it would not be long before this highly desirable work is resumed on a large scale than in the past. The information which Mr. Nicholson gave the House was an eye-opener for many members, and every statement made was supported by facts and figures. But he did not uncover all the facts, nor did he enlarge upon the points made because of the short time at his disposal. It is talk like his outside the Province that will meet the facts he set out, but the great ignorance of the value of its natural resources of its attractiveness from other viewpoints. It is this great outside world that is in need of education as to the resources and attractions of Prince Edward Island, and not the people of that province who would seem to be the case if one is to judge by the amount of the past and is happening today. Mr. Nicholson has made an excellent beginning. But he should not be allowed to plough a lonely furrow.

The value of the man power census recently completed by the National Service Board is being demonstrated in regard to the solution of war problems in various parts of the country. In fact a preliminary call to national service has already been made. The coal situation and other transportation difficulties have been traced largely to scarcity of locomotive engineers, round-house mechanics and other skilled labor. The names of many such men are available through the National Service cards which have been filed out, and the Railway Commission has requisitioned several hundred men of these skilled trades through the National Service Board. A special staff is at work in the statistics branch of the National Service Board locating the men needed from amongst those who are skilled in the trades required and who are not engaged in other work but have expressed a willingness to go back to their old occupations during the war should they be needed in the service of the country.

Passports enabling civilians to leave Canada for England will not be granted by the Department of External Affairs is satisfied that the reasons for issuing these documents are weighty and urgent and until the applicant can satisfy the Department of his financial ability to maintain himself in the United Kingdom and to return to Canada. This order was issued by the Government in view of the fact that there are many Canadian civilians in the United Kingdom who are not performing any useful service to the empire, and in the matter of the food supply they are an unwarranted burden on the British government.

The Government is waging war upon all persons and combinations suspected of unduly enhancing the cost of living in Canada. W. F. O'Connor, the Halifax lawyer, who is enforcing the new regulations for the prevention of public exploitation through high prices, is vigorously applying the powers conferred upon him with beneficial results. He has discovered what he believes to be a criminal conspiracy on the part of a western sugar-refining company, and he has applied to the Attorneys-General of two western provinces for permission to indict that company. The "criminal conspiracy," it is declared, has been entered into by the refining company with a number of western jobbers and wholesalers, and its object is the maintenance of prices fixed by the refining company for its sugar products. It is understood that this company has an agreement with the jobbers and wholesalers with whom it deals whereby the latter agreed to maintain the prices fixed from time to time by the refining company, and the company agreed to pay the jobbers and wholesalers a bonus of six per cent. on all sugar sold at the list prices as fixed from time to time. The jobbers and wholesalers also agreed not to sell the sugar of any other refinery, nor to sell to buyers on terms of credit more favorable than those dictated by the refinery. It is understood that the company, which is a subsidiary of the Canadian Sugar Refineries Company of Vancouver, and the Attorneys-General to whom the applications have been made by Mr. O'Connor. The Cost of Living Commissioner, are those of Alberta and British Columbia. The company has connections from Vancouver to Winnipeg. Every sugar refinery in Canada has been asked under oath as to whether it is carrying on business under like conditions.

But sugar is not the only thing that Commissioner O'Connor is paying attention to. He is also after the coal barons. As a matter of fact forty or fifty associations of coal dealers in various cities and towns throughout Canada which have been accustomed to mutually agree upon a common price of coal to their customers have been compulsorily dissolved as a result of the Commissioner's activity. These associations, it is stated, have extended from the extreme west to the extreme east of the Dominion. Various individuals cases of threatened advance in prices by combines have been brought to the attention of the Minister of Labor and his Commissioner, and have been frustrated as a consequence of prompt action on their part. One result in evidence at the moment is that although there has been a scarcity of the black diamonds throughout Canada the price of coal has not been unduly advanced, and in not a few instances there has been no advance at all. In other words the potato combine that was under fire, and now it is the sugar and coal combines. Potatoes, sugar and coal are all necessities, and any attempts to unduly advance prices in respect of any of these commodities should be frowned upon. If Commissioner O'Connor is successful in preventing such inflation of prices he will be entitled to the thanks of the long suffering consumer and amply justify his appointment. Incidentally the Government which brought about the investigations he is

conducting is entitled to a large measure of credit.

The magnificent total of \$623,000 is the result of the three days campaign held in Ottawa, this week for the Canadian Patriotic and Red Cross Funds, one eighth going to the latter organization. The Civil Service responded nobly to the call for funds, the handsome sum of \$137,330 being subscribed by them. Self Denial deposits at different points in the city turned in over \$110,000. The city schools were also organized and the average contribution per school was \$200. Everybody helped to the extent of their ability. One newsboy broke into his bank and handed over \$50 to the collectors, while a Belgian mother with three sons in the front contribution, \$35 and an Italian woman who could neither speak nor write English handed over ten cents. A scrap of paper upon which the sacrifice of a widow who has given two sons to the war was pictured in a few trembling pen strokes. It is a check for \$25 out of a very small income upon which this mother of two Canadian soldiers is dependent. "I want to do my bit along with my boys," she said as she took the bit of paper out of her pocket at the headquarters of the Patriotic Fund. "I have three sons, and two of them enlisted when the war started and one of them is buried in Belgium. My name on this check will prove no more for the cause, he died for than his name on a church window." Forty-five cars were at the disposal of the canvassers throughout the campaign. These cars were donated by local garage owners and many doctors.

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Sir George Foster was asked by a deputation of leather workers the other day to do something, if possible, to relieve the leather situation in Canada. That commodity is scarce, and one of the reasons is that a restriction has been put upon the export of hides by Australia, from which country a goodly portion of the hides previously came. Newmarket and Montreal interests were represented in the deputation. Sir George promised to do what he could in the matter.

A new government regulation brought about by the German submarine warfare demands that no Canadian ship be permitted to leave Canada without a license, and only when it is established that the trip will be of useful service. The license committee is composed of Alex. Johnston, Deputy Minister of Marine, G. Desbarats, Deputy of the Naval Service, and J. McDougall, Commissioner of Customs.

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
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HIS MAJESTY THE KING EXPRESSED APPRECIATION


