APPEAL CASES ADJOURNED FOR JUDGMENT

Two appeal cases, the King, respondent vs Myrtle Pryor, appellant and the King, respondent vs. Elizabeth Ann Lawless, appellant, were adjourned for judgment by presiding judge, Mr. Justice A. C. Saunders, late yesterday afternoon when counsel concluded argument. The case opened Wednesday. The Pryor case was an appeal from a conviction for unlawful sale of liquor and the Lawless case an appeal from a conviction for keeping for sale, contrary to the Prohibition Act.

Two cases were disposed of yesterday before court adjourned to meet at 11 o'clock Monday morning. In the case of certiorari, Grace Smith vs Hugh Cummins, Sr., by agreement the conviction was quashed and the case dismissed with costs.

The appeal was allowed without costs in the case of the King, respondent vs. Richard Quinn, respondent vs. an appeal from a conviction under the Prohibition Act. In moving that the appeal be allowed the Attorney General explained that it was in view of the fact that a conviction had been recorded against Veronica Quinn, Richard Quinn's wife, Mr. J. A. MacDonald, K. C., was appellant's counsel.

Argument in the case, the King vs. James Gormley, would be heard Monday, the Court announced.

Conclusion of the Pryor and Lawless cases yesterday came after more than two days argument by counsel. Attorney General Thane A. Campbell, K. C., for the Crown and Mr. J. J. Johnston, K. C., for the appellants. In the course of the argument Mr. Johnston raised the point, new in prohibition cases, that under the Prohibition Act of this Province there could be no sale of liquor held unlawfully. He based his argument on section 88 of the Act which declares, "No property rights of any kind shall exist in liquors held unlawfully....in this province." Sale was the transfer of property rights in goods, Counsel said, therefore when no property rights existed there could be no sale.

Attorney general Campbell maintained the definition of sale had a wide application and was the transfer by contract of property. What the Prohibition Act did in section 88 was to take away right of civil action, such as power to recover liquors stolen or sue for the price of liquor sold, the Attorney General maintained.


The committee is leaving no stone unturned to make this production one that will be remembered for some time.


