ORDERS GIVEN FOR ARREST OF BRUCE FOR SEDITION

Vice President of U. M. W. Chairman of Meeting Denies That Bruce Uttered the Seditious Words Charged Against Him.

(Canadian Press.) HALIFAX, May 8.—Instructions were issued by Attorney General W. O'Hara tonight to have Mal-dale arrested and charge sedition on a charge of seditious utterances attributed to him. The Union Jack will be dragged by the mud and the Red Flag will fly in Canada as the standard of Freedom for the worker. The telegram which Attorney General O'Hara sent to M. A. Paterson, crown prosecutor at Sydney, stated that if Bruce said the above words to "secure his immediate arrest and charge sedition under section 134, criminal code," Section 134 of the criminal code provides that "anyone is guilty of an indictable offence and liable to two years in prison who speaks any seditious words or publishes any seditious libel or is a party to any seditious conspiracy."

Cross U. S. Without Stop In Less Than 27 Hours

Spleen Unnecessary To Life Yet has Usefulness

(Canadian Press.) HALIFAX, May 8.—The spleen is not an indispensable organ of the human body, although it probably is useful. This is the conclusion reached by Prof. Charles Richet of the Academy of Sciences, after a number of experiments. In a communication to the Academy, Prof. Richet makes the suggestion that there are other organs in the same category—unnecessary to life, but having certain usefulness. Animals which have had their spleens removed live a normal period without any appreciable physiological disturbances. Human beings have undergone the same operation without noticeable inconvenience. Nevertheless, Prof. Richet believes that the absence of the spleen may have certain ill effects. He has discovered that in order to preserve their normal weight animals which have had their spleens removed require more food than others. Moreover if for any reason they are unable to eat more than normally constituted animals the spleenless ones become weak and die.

German Magnates Heavily Fined

(Special To The Guardian.) PARIS, May 8.—Gustav Krupp Von Bohlen and Halbach, sentenced to fifteen years were fined 1,000,000,000 marks for inciting a riot at the Krupp works. Directors Baur, Scheffer, Shropper, Kuntz, associated with Krupp, received similar sentences of twenty years and individual fines of 100,000,000 marks.

200 TRIPOLI REBELS KILLED BY ITALIAN TROOPS

G.W.V.A. Demand Recall of Pension Board and Secretary

A. here last night, a resolution was passed requesting parliament to recall the Board of Pension Commissioners and its secretary because "they have so miserably failed to do justice to the returned men of this country and to the widows and orphans of returned men."

Governor Grant Returns From Atlantic City

(Canadian Press.) MONTREAL, May 8.—Hon. MacCallum Grant, Lieut. Governor of Nova Scotia will leave this evening for Halifax, having returned from Atlantic City, where he was recuperating following an illness in a hospital in this city.

Conscience Money Received in Halifax

(Canadian Press.) HALIFAX, May 8.—This dollar is the property of one of the departments of the Nova Scotia Government. It was the message attached to a dollar bill received at the office of the Provincial Secretary this morning. The message bore a Halifax date line and was unsigned.

Canadian Sapper Fast in Ice

(Canadian Press.) NORTH SYDNEY, May 8.—The Merchant Marine steamer Canadian Sapper which sailed from this port yesterday morning at five o'clock for Montreal, coal laden is still fast in the ice off Flat Point where she has been held since a few hours after sailing from this port.

Montcahn to Rescue of Steamer Kyle

(Canadian Press.) OTTAWA, May 8.—The Canadian Government ice breaker Montcahn has left St. Pauls Island to go to the rescue of the passenger steamer Kyle, which became helpless in the ice two weeks ago, while on a regular passage from Newfoundland to North Sydney and is now about eight miles off Flat Point with two of her passengers seriously ill.

Irish Irregulars Being Rounded up

(Canadian Press.) DUBLIN, May 8.—A round up of Irish Irregulars is progressing in mountainous Wicklow, where large numbers are reported in hiding.

Quebec Dog Derby Will Probably be An Annual Event

(Canadian Press.) MONTREAL, Que., May 8.—That the Quebec Dog Derby will be an annual institution is practically assured. Last season's event proved so successful that dogs are being bought up at high prices all over the country and almost every village in the province of Quebec boasts at least one trainer and prospective cup challenger.

Heroic Action of Telephone Operator Saved Town

(Canadian Press.) AILSA CRAIG, Ont., May 8.—The business section of Ailsa Craig town is in ruins as the result of a fire which broke out in a barn this afternoon on the south side of Main Street and in three hours consumed the buildings on that street in that block. The loss was estimated at \$125,000 to \$150,000. That the fire-swept area was not greater is due to the heroism of a telephone operator who, though the switchboard and sent out S. O. S. calls to London, Parkhill, Lucan and Crediton.

Millions of U. S. Trees Sent To French Battlefields

(Canadian Press.) NEW YORK, May 8.—Millions of "good will" delegates sailed from this port today for France. These "good will" delegates are American tree seeds presented to the French government for reforesting battle areas by Charles Lathrop Pack, president of the American Tree Association. A similar shipment was turned over to the British Embassy at Washington a few days ago.

Temperature 101 In California

Howatts Appeal Was Dismissed

(Canadian Press.) OTTAWA, May 8.—The appeal of Alexander Howatt, ex-president of the United Mine Workers of America against the action of the inspector of immigration at McAdam Junction in refusing him admittance to Canada has been dismissed by the Department of Immigration here, it was announced this morning.

Negro Pensioner Was Slave for 40 Years

(Canadian Press.) WASHINGTON, May 8.—The oldest employe on the retirement rolls of the government is Mark Thrash, a negro, of Rossville, Georgia, who, according to the Bureau of Pensions is 102 years old and has been in the federal employe for 28 years. He was retired last year as a laborer in the Chickamauga and Chattanooga National Military Park, at Chattanooga, Ga. He claims to have been born in Louisiana County, Virginia, and for more than forty years was a slave, the property of a Dr. Christopher Thrash. Way back with a gang to clear land on a plantation bought by his master in Meriwether County, Georgia, and there had many encounters with the Indians. After the Civil War Thrash went to Arkansas, but returned again to Chattanooga, about the time the Central of Georgia Railroad was under construction, and there he got a job.

Chinese Ordered To Release Captives At Any Cost

(Canadian Press.) PEKING, May 8.—The Chinese government has ordered the governor of Shantung province to effect the release of kidnapped foreigners even if they have to pay the \$1,000,000 ransom demanded.
