SAYS FAMINE IN RUSSIA OVER. NO DEATHS BY STARVATION

NEW YORK, Aug. 1.—Colonel N. Haskell, director of the American Relief Association in Russia, returned home today on the Cunard Line steamship Aquitania in company with Director Edgar Richardson and Walter Lyman Brown, European director of the Association. In a statement given to newspapermen, Colonel Haskell declared that the famine was over in the Volga Valley, and that death by starvation has ceased since last April. He said that the Hoover Relief had sent more than a billion pounds of food into the stricken area and that in all about ten million Russians were fed during the famine months. Eighteen thousand kitchens are still operating, but the need for them is diminishing, and this year's harvest would be enough for all. Twenty thousand villages and townships were supplied. Col. Haskell and his associates in the work will have a conference with Secretary Hoover within the next few days, either in Washington or Boston. On April 1, there were still 120,000 Russians on the relief payroll. The late Czar's chief aide, Pischkin, is boiling beans for children in the former palace of Tsaroko-Selo. According to Colonel Haskell the Soviet Government is co-operating loyally with the relief administration. The statement of Colonel Haskell is in keeping with that of former Governor Goodrich, of Indiana, who recently returned from the stricken area, that now all was going well, and that this year's harvest would be enough for all.
