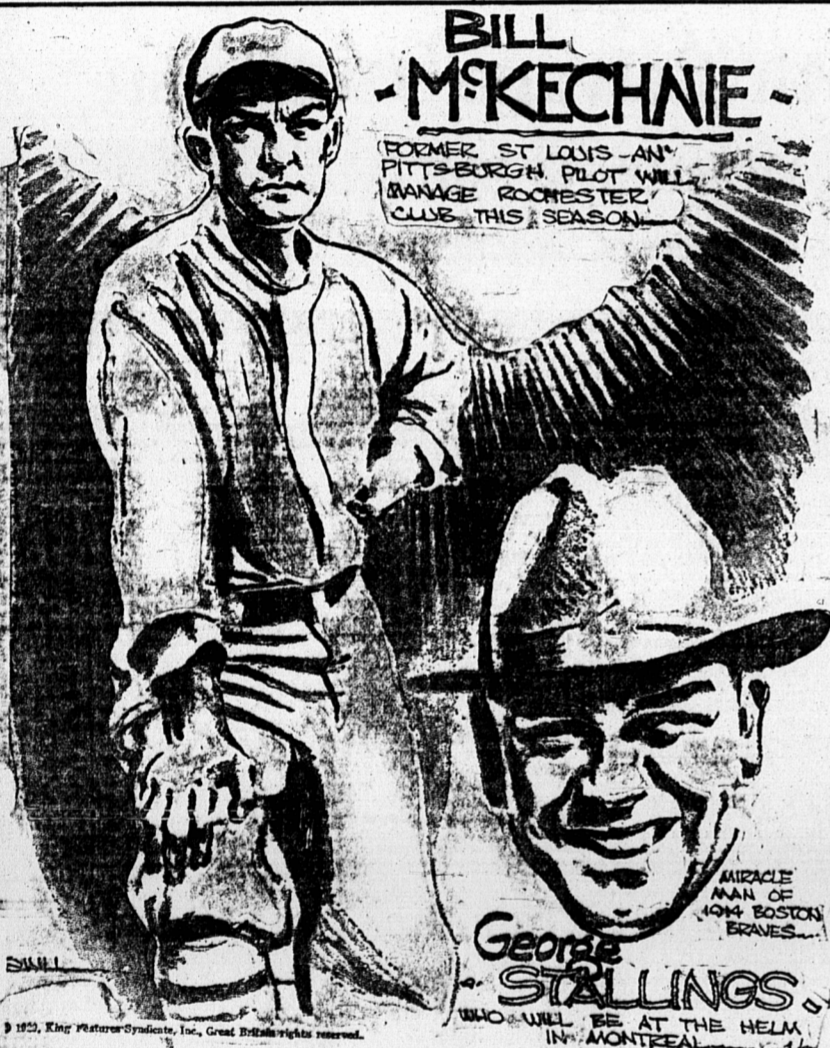

LEAGUE'S FRIENDLY ENEMIES

BILL MCKECHNIE

FORMER ST. LOUIS AND PITTSBURGH PILOT WILL MANAGE ROCHESTER CLUB THIS SEASON

When the International League unfolds its tents this year it will probably sport the most famous managers of any minor league aggregation in baseball. The latest additions to the roster of International pilots are Bill McKechnie and Tris Speaker, McKechnie gallops into his new job at Rochester with the reputation of having managed two big league pennant winners during the last three years, the Pirates and the Cardinals, while Speaker, once the best outfielder in the game and famous as the pilot of world champion Cleveland Indians in 1920, will be managing the Newark club. Last year the International League had a fighting bunch of managers, including such luminaries of the baseball world as George Stallings, the Miracle Man of the 1924 Boston Braves, who managed the Montreal, and Bill Clymer, who has won more pennants in the minor league than any other manager, in the pilot house at Buffalo. Stallings had a nervous breakdown during last season with the Royals and his mirroring at Montreal was

thereby handicapped. It was feared that the breakdown was due to heart trouble, but the late dope is that it was caused by infected teeth and after having all of his molars yanked it is said that he will again take active charge of the Montreal club this Spring. Baseball fans everywhere will be glad to hear this as it was feared that he might have to give up the game forever. While some of the boys insist that McKechnie never rated a managerial berth it seems that he did a particularly good job of it while he was in Pittsburgh and St. Louis. In St. Louis, where he helped steer the Cards into a world's series last Fall, he is charged with lacking punch, pepper and politics. But even his enemies must admit that he is very sincere and very genuine. Perhaps too sincere and genuine for this generation. Rochester, one of the spots where the Cardinals maintain one of their chain stores, won the pennant last year and so Bill will still be in the employ of the Cardinal management and at the same time be with a pennant winning troupe, even if he isn't in St. Louis. While he was never an outstanding star as an active participant he was always what is referred to as a smart ball player and his boosters say that he is a smart manager. He started playing ball with the Butler, Pa., club in 1905, and since that time he has played with fourteen different teams. He grabbed off his first managerial experience with the Newark club of the Federal League when he was 23 years old. In 1919 he made one of those "retirements" and started in the business of manufacturing clay sewer pipe at Toronto, Ohio. In 1920 he was back in Pittsburgh only to be farmed out to Minneapolis. But it wasn't for long. In July, 1922, he was back with the Pirates as manager and remained there until they won the world's title in 1925. In the winter Bill returns to his home town of Wilkesburg, Pa., where he sings in the Methodist church choir, and he should have been ace high with Owner Sam Breadon, at St. Louis, as Sam is known as the singing magnate of the major leagues. Bill will take his part-time voice and his baseball ability to Rochester in the Spring and with the list of pilots lined up in the International League there should be plenty of red fire from Montreal to Baltimore.

McKie Resigns From Mar. Branch

Vice President for New Brunswick Quits Organization — Personal Views on Amateur Situation Differ From Other Officials.

The New Glasgow Evening News of Saturday, January 26th, says: Stating that he was dissatisfied with the strangling and smothering process through which the amateur principles are being milled, S. E. McKie, Vice President for New Brunswick in the Maritime Branch of the Canadian Amateur Athletic Union of Canada, resigned yesterday. Giving his reason for such action, the former Vice President stated that in addition to his dissatisfaction with the manner in which amateur sport is being carried on, he could not devote the necessary time to the office until thus felt that his resignation was the proper line of action. The news of Mr. McKie's resignation from the Maritime Branch will be received with great concern in Pictou County, where he was well known for his connection with amateur sport for the past few years.

Mr. McKie's action is only one of several which are expected to follow within the next few months. At least, rumors of this nature have been on the rounds for the past few weeks, and although the officials may be urged to remain in office until the end of the present term, it is expected that some of the leading lights will disinterested themselves from further association with the Eastern Canadian Branch after this year. The condition of affairs throughout the whole Maritime at the present time is none too certain, and combined with the open manner in which the hockey situation has been handled this season, it is not an encouraging note to present at the next annual meeting of the Branch.

Mr. McKie's resignation to President D. Webb Fraser is as follows:— Mr. D. W. Fraser, Pres. M.P.B.A.A.U. of C., Amherst, N. S. Dear Webb:—Business will not permit me to give the M.P.B.A.A.U. of C. the time and attention it requires, and as I do not like the smothering and strangling process through which our amateur principles are being milled, I reluctantly have to tender you this, my resignation. The Athletic Clubs all seem satisfied, the sport editors who mould the amateur thought of the provinces are apparently satisfied, and as the sporting public are not complaining conditions would seem to be fairly satisfactory, but as we read our constitution and our principles as quoted below it is time to ask the question: "Whither bound?"

"The Union exists to aid in the promotion and supervision of clean, wholesome, vigorous competition for the individual who desires to take part in such activities solely for the pleasure and the physical, mental and social benefits to be derived therefrom, who receives no material remuneration either directly or indirectly, and who has no other avocation."

"The Union seeks to emphasize the importance and value of sportsmanship, the love of the game for the game's sake, the discountenancing of unfair and dishonest tactics, and the desire to win at all costs. Through the medium of competitive athletics it seeks to promote health, character and citizenship."

"The aim of the Amateur Athletic Union, your Union, cannot be accomplished without the co-operation of every athlete, every official and every citizen, all of whom should see to it that the highest ideals and traditions of British sportsmanship and fair play are maintained and developed."

I want to thank you and Charlie for your warm friendship and their assistance. With best wishes for the success of Amateur Athletics in these provinces, I remain, Yours very truly, S. E. McKIE.
