CHAMBERLAIN

Hon. Mr. Brassey Said He did the Right Thing.

By Resigning His Position in the British Cabinet—Other News That is Really Worth Reading.

LONDON, Oct. 4.—Alfred Baldwin, M. P., speaking at the West Worcester Conservative Association, said if we refused the proposals of the imperial premier for retaliatory and preferential tariffs we shall lose the colonies who might adopt preferential treaties with foreign countries.

Hon. T. Brassey, speaking in Liverpool on his arrival from Winnipeg, where he went to view Canada's wheat growing resources; said I am convinced the territory is capable of producing all the wheat the empire needs for generations to come. Chamberlain has taken the right course by resigning.

Prof. Ashley, formerly of Toronto University, has come out while presenting strong preferential tariffs within the empire, he does not believe in colonies to the mother country, but is eager to develop commercial chances. He says that if they do not enter some scheme with Great Britain they will ultimately range themselves against her.

Canadian government commercial agent Ball at Birmingham informs me that one of the largest flour dealers in Great Britain, which lately gave a trial order of 500 bags of flour to the Kent Milling Co., Chatham, Ont., says we beg to say that this is the finest Canadian patent we ever saw. It makes a splendid loaf in both bloom and texture. We are trying to buy a line for shipment and we feel bound to say if your Canadian millers can ship us flour of this kind and keep shipping up to the quality, they will have little trouble in displacing the fine winter patents on our market that we are now getting from the United States.

The Times says the colonies are capable of supplying nearly all our requirements and they are also capable of keeping our factories in full and steady work. Our system of unrestricted imports was the policy of the little Englander who regarded colonies as encumbrances. We have come to regard them as the brightest jewels in the crown of the Empire, and we owe it to them as well as to ourselves to mark and accentuate a relationship which both sides may well be proud to claim.

The Strand says so far as appearances go the colonists are not quite so anxious, nor should we blame them for it, to develop their industries as our foreign rivals. The German press continues to urge all manner of objection to the adoption of a protectionist tariff by England. The Chamber of Commerce of Chemnitz, Germany reports that the increase in imports into Canada has hit the Saxon textile industry very hard, especially on cotton woven gloves and stockings which were largely exported from Saxony to Canada, and the additional increase of 33.13 per cent will completely prevent continuation of the Saxony export to Canada. The toy industry is also seriously affected. The while of this export trade to Canada will be lost if an increase of 33.13 per cent duty becomes permanent. The German Chamber of Commerce urges a friendly arrangement with Canada, on the basis of mutual concessions. It points out the serious consequences of customs war with Canada, as it would endanger German commercial relations with England.

The Financial, referring to the probable investigation by the Canadian attorney of the Dominion Oil Co., says such an investigation would probably lead to some very serious disclosures.

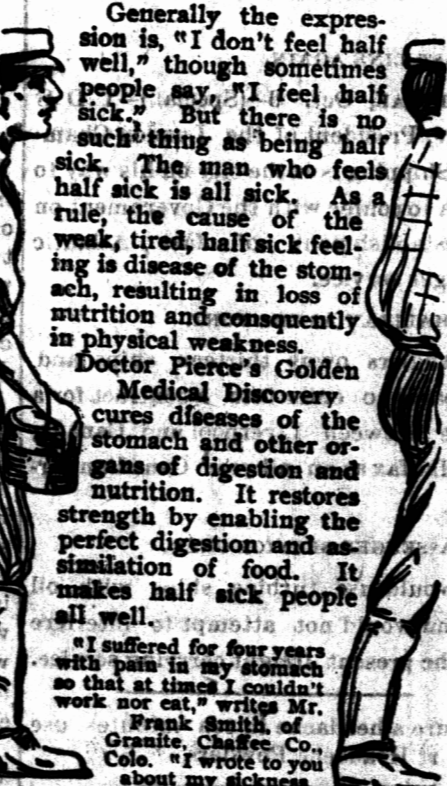

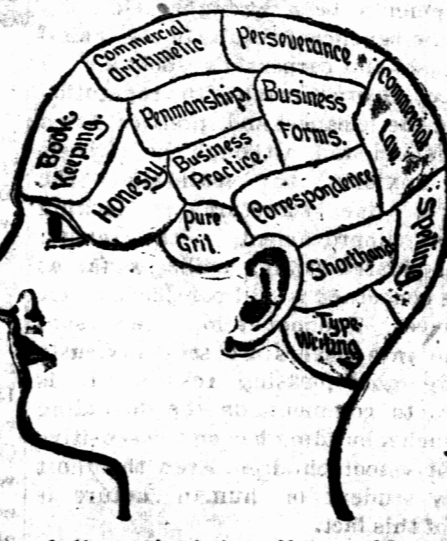

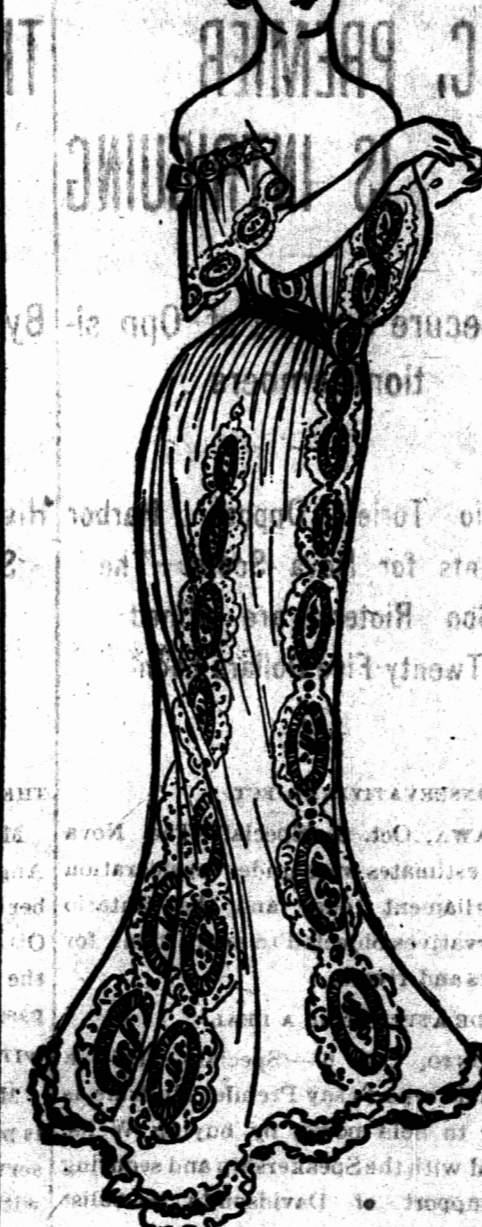
