Slaughter's Homer Inside Park Gives Cards Double Victory Over Brooklyn

ST. LOUIS, July 19—(AP)—LWING darkness man- gled crowded Sportsman's Park but not the drama unfolded in the 11th inning of a doubleheader nightcap between the Cardinals and Brooklyn Dodgers today when outfielder Enos Slaughter lifted a home run inside the Park to give the Cards a double victory before 34,443 fans.

The Cards, striving to narrow the gap between the league-leading Dodgers and themselves, grabbed a 7-6 triumph from Slaughter's unusual climax punch to mate with the easier, 8-3 verdict they acquired in the opener.

Pete Reiser, ace Dodger outfielder, was injured attempting a one-hand catch of Slaughter's blow. He crashed in the right outfield wall after it appeared he had made the catch, and the ball dropped free. He was taken to hospital. The extent of his injuries is not known.

At Chicago, the hapless Phils pumped out 13 hits to win the first game of a doubleheader from the Cubs 8-6 but dropped the second 8-4.

Yankees Show Burst Of Power Crushing White Sox In Doubleheader, 9-2, 12-0

NEW YORK, July 19—(CP)—NEW YORK Yankees wound up their home stand against the Western Clubs with a burst of power today, crushing Chicago White Sox in both ends of a doubleheader, 9-2 and 12-0, to boost their winning streak to nine games in a row.

Hank Gowdy, talked up his ninth pitching victory against one defeat in the opener, scattering nine hits, while Charley (Red) Ebbing blanked the White Sox on four safeties in the atterpiece and drove in four tallies on two singles and a three-run homer.

Free agent Hemsley signed By Yankees

NEW YORK, July 19—(AP)—Forty-thousand baseball fans who turned out for today's doubleheader between New York Yankees and Chicago White Sox were surprised to find Rollie Hemsley, released only two days ago by Cincinnati Reds, catching for the Yankees in the opening game.

Yankee officials, announcing that Hemsley had been signed as a free agent, disclosed that catcher Buddy Rosar jumped the club Saturday night and left for his home in Buffalo, N.Y., to take a civil service examination for the police force of that city.

With their first-string catcher, Bill Dickey, benched by a shoulder injury, the Yankees would have been placed in somewhat of a predicament by Rosar's action if Hemsley had not been available.

Manager Joe McCarthy revealed that Rosar asked permission last week to go home but said he had denied the request because of the team's shortage of catchers.

McCarthy said he did not plan to suspend Rosar immediately. "I will withhold decision in the matter," he said, "until I can come to a decision fair to all parties."

With Hemsley signed, the Yankees optioned their youngest catcher, Ed Kease, to the New York farm in the International League.

Manager Jimmy Dukes of the White Sox, maintaining that Kease still was a member of the club, protested the first game today on the grounds the Yankees had 26 men, one over the player limit.

Informed of Dukes' protest, president Ed Barrow of the Yankees declared:

"We released Kease on option to Newark and the proper papers were filed with the league office. Kease was not in uniform and there are no grounds for the protest."

In his first appearance at bat for the Yanks, Hemsley singled in the second inning of the first game today and later scored the fourth run of the contest for the world champions.

Seven records Broken in Swim meet

ST. ADELDE, Que., July 19—(CP)—Seven new Canadian records stood today as evidence of the class of competitors from various parts of Canada at the United States who participated in this year's Dominion swimming and diving championships.

Four records were shattered yesterday in concluding events of the two-day meet held at the St. Adele Lodge and Country Club in this resort, 45 miles north of Montreal. The records were broken Friday and a Dominion mark was set for the junior women's 150 yard medley swim. Margie Thompson of Hamilton set a time of 2:08.6 for the event, for which there was no record.

Honors in the record breaking were pretty well divided but P. T. Hays extra hand cap was de- served by the New York Women's Swimming Association team, com- posed of Gloria Callan, Marilyn Eshner and Lorraine Fisher.

Petite Miss Sahner smashed the record for the women's 200 yards free style race in finishing ahead of Irene Barr of Hamilton and Kay Gordon of Winnipeg.

The New Yorker, who also won the Dominion title for the senior women's 100 yards free style crown, clipped one and four tenths of a second off the existing record of 2:20.8.

Miss Callan, holder of 34 break- stroke records, set new Canadian record for the senior women's 100 yards backstroke event as she finished ahead of Bernice Bell of Hamilton. Out on a high station, Vancouver's swimming star.

Leading the field all the way, Miss Callan, who paced the New Yorkers to a recent backstroke vic- tory, was followed by Irene Barr, medley relay, knocked almost two seconds off the record of 1:22.2. The relay, the American team beat the Canadian 4:12 record by almost five seconds.

The relay record also was broken by Hamilton's Margie Thompson, Irene Barr, and Betty Patterson who finished behind the New Yorkers. The record for this event was broken by both the New York and Vancouver teams when the semi-final heats were swished off.

Also broken was the senior women's 300 yards medley relay by a Mon- real team made up of Jean M. Dymers, Aurel Thomas and G. Rie- Call. The tri-finisher in 3:11.2 to beat the tri-finisher by more than a second.

Eight tenths of a second were clipped off the record for the senior women's 200 yards free style relay by a Winnipeg team captained by Kay Gordon.

SPECIAL PRIZES FOR DRIVERS AND OWNERS

A special ribbon will be given to the owner of the winning horse in each race. THE MACDONALD TOBACCO COMPANY OF MONTREAL has donated a beautiful Trophy, known as the British Consols Trophy, which will be awarded to the Driver scoring the most points during the meeting. This Association will also give \$20 to the driver scoring the most points during the meeting \$10 to the driver scoring the second most points during the meet. First place counts five points, second place three points, third place two points and fourth place one point.

\$10 will be given the driver driving the fastest heat trotted during the meet and \$10 to the driver driving the fastest heat paced during the meet.

\$10 will be given the caretaker of the horse trotting the fastest heat and \$10 to the caretaker of the horse pacing the fastest heat.

\$10 will be given to winning drivers of each race.

\$5 will be given to the caretaker of each horse winning a race in the trotting and pacing classes during the meet.

\$50 will be given to the owner of the horse that beats track pacing record of 2:05 1/2 except as provided for below. \$50 to the owner of the horse that beats the track trotting record of 2:07 1/2 except as provided for below. In case two horses beat the above records then the awards go to the fastest horse. If two horses tie for the awards the money will be divided equally.

GENERAL CONDITIONS

(ALL RACES MILE HEATS)

The Charlottetown Race Track is now one of the fastest, best laid out and cared for tracks, and surely the most beautifully situated of any in the Maritime Provinces. A great deal of effort will be made to keep it in apple pie order, all through the period before the races and during the races so that no horse will become unsound or suffer injury and to enable them to make fast time.

Horsemen (providing they are racing exclusively at our meeting) by wiring at our expense notifying us of their arrival will be met at the train and their baggage transferred to the grounds without cost to them, also taken away without cost to them. Every effort will be made to make the horsemen's stay pleasant and send them away feeling that they have been well treated.

All races to be raced on three heat plan: 10 per cent of each purse will be awarded to the winner. The remainder will be divided into three equal parts, one part to be raced for each heat. In the event of there being three heat winners they shall have a fourth heat to determine the winners. Any horse winning the first two heats in any race shall relinquish pole position and assume last position.

Entries divided 40, 30, 15 and 12 per cent. Entry fee 5 per cent. Five per cent of the money raced for each heat will be deducted from the first and second horses; 3 per cent from the third horse and 2 per cent from the fourth horse. Entrance fees and deductions do not apply to Futurities.

Six horses to enter and four to start.

Rights reserved to change program, reject any entry, or if entry appears to lay over the field to the extent that there is not, in the opinion of the management, sufficient competition, then the said entry may be transferred to a faster class or entry fee refunded, but any driver and to declare race off on account of bad weather, or failing to obtain satisfactory number of entries or starters to transfer horses to another class to which they are eligible, re-open or substitute another without advertising, or alter or extend racing dates.

THE OFFICIALS

The officials will be selected for their experience and reliability and will be instructed to carry out the rules firmly and fairly. All purse money will be paid immediately after the race and horsemen are asked to get same from Secretary before leaving.

PRESENTATION OF PRIZE MONEY

Friday evening on or about 8:30 o'clock the President will award special ribbons, prizes to the winning owners, drivers and caretakers, at the Judges stand and those winning awards will please be on hand to receive them.
