Worrell, conducting an inquest into the death of the girl. The inquest was ordered after the girl's body was found in a neighboring pond. A jury decided the girl committed suicide because her father flogged her and refused to let her keep company with "her lover."

RED CROSS MEETING—The

NEW ST. ANDREW STATUE IN ROME

A statue, 20 feet high, of St. Andrew, patron saint of Scotland, is being erected on the facade of St. Peter's in Rome. It will replace the present image of the saint, which has become so weather beaten that repairs are impossible. The new statue consists of six huge blocks of white marble having a total weight of 20 tons.

Fameuse Apples And Storage

Owing to the excessive premature breakdown in storage of Fameuse apples during recent years, this variety has been specially investigated at the Dominion Experimental Station at Fredericton. There has been an impression in certain quarters, says Mr. L. C. Young, that this premature breakdown is probably caused by picking at too late a date. In other words, that New Brunswick Fameuse are allowed to become too mature before being picked. In order to gain further information, a picking test was inaugurated, four trees being included in the test, each tree being picked on 3 different dates at intervals of approximately one week. The dates of picking were September 22, 26; October 6, 13, and 20. In this way it was made sure that at least one definitely immature sample and one definitely over-mature sample were obtained. These lots were submitted to the Station's regular examinations at intervals of one month during the winter months, and although the fruit examination and interpretation of results have not been completed, certain interesting leads have already been secured. A great deal in the way of size, colour, and quality is sacrificed in the early picking. In the last picking, as high as 90 per cent water core was encountered in one tree. These apples were of exceptionally good flavor. Water core disappeared during the storage without any ill effects, and at the time of the February examination, the late picked apples showed by far the least breakdown of any lot. Naturally, very late picking is impractical owing to the heavy drop encountered. When all factors are considered, it is very doubtful if a change in the ordinary date of picking Fameuse apples is justified.

Housewives Demand Lean Bacon

Mr. C. D. Davis, local manager of the Maritima Cold Storage Co. Ltd., accompanied by Mr. Walter Wilson, assistant manager, Mr. W. A. Beer, accountant and Messrs. Fred Egan and Brent Garnum, salesmen, have gone to Montreal where they will attend the annual sales convention of the Maritimes and Quebec being held this week.

Menace Of Low Grade Seed

Low grade seed is a menace to the reputation of Canada in the export markets and a drag in the domestic market. The marketing of seeds in general in the last three or four years has been stunted by serious difficulties and comparatively low prices to growers, but has at least taught the value of producing a high grade product. No 1 seed has almost always sold at a profitable price, while low grade seed has been unsaleable or sold at a loss to the grower. It should be the practice of every grower, advises The Agricultural Situation bulletin, to save seed only from clean fields, so that it may be cleaned to grade No. 1.

EXPORTS OF PAINTS

Export of paints in February was one of the value of \$27,839 compared with \$15,511 in February 1933; most of it went to Great Britain. The export of varnish, 587 gallons at \$628, was less than normal.
