AWARDED MEDAL BY RADIO



For the first time in the history of the world, the award of a medal for life-saving was made over the radio when, on the night of February 17th, Sir Henry Thornton, President of the Canadian National Railways, speaking from CNRO, Ottawa, presented the medal of the Royal Humane Society to Mrs. K. G. Polyblank, wife of a civil engineer in the service of the Company. Mrs. Polyblank was in her home at O'Brien in the northern part of Quebec Province and as Sir Henry Thornton, in Ottawa, reached the appropriate moment in his address, the medal was handed to Mrs. Polyblank who, with a number of friends, listened to the address through a receiving set installed in her home.

The deed for which the award was made took place at Long Lac, Ontario, in the summer of 1925. Mrs. Polyblank plunging overboard from a motor boat to save the young child of a friend who had slipped over the side. Mrs. Polyblank swam to the child, maintaining it afloat, divested herself of clinging clothing, and calmly awaited the arrival of rescuers, being practically exhausted when reached.
