POTATO STEAMER HERE—The S. S. Olaf Moersk, Capt. Hosen, arrived in port Saturday night (and docked last night at the Railroad Wharf), whence she is now loading 10,000 sacks, and 2,000 barrels of seed potatoes for the Cuban market. She will likely leave Tuesday night.

SUPREME COURT—On Thursday the case of Barnes vs. Kennedy & Co. O'Leary, action for damages in the sale of a quantity of oats was before the court. Verdict for plaintiffs for \$700. W. E. Bentley, for plaintiff, J. D. Stewart, K. C. and Matthews for defendant. The case of Geo. B. MacLeod vs. United Cannery, Ltd., is now before the court. A. C. Saunders for plaintiff and D. E. Shaw for defendant.

TRAINS LATE.—The evening trains for Summerside yesterday were late in arriving on account of a wrecked switching engine being derailed at Winsloe and holding up traffic. Number 3 train due to arrive in Summerside at 6:15 p. m. did not get here until 7 o'clock and number 214 due in Summerside at 4:15 did not arrive in Summerside till 10:13 p. m.

RETURNS HOME.—Dr. Owen Teddy of Windsor, N. S., left on return yesterday morning, accompanied by his mother, Mrs. Wm. Teddy who has been ill in this province for the past two months. Mrs. Teddy arrived here on a visit to her brother, Mr. John Brown and other relatives in Powal. Shortly after arriving she was taken ill and has been under the doctors' care ever since. Yesterday night her son, Dr. Owen Teddy, arrived in the city with a parlor car and checked at the office of the Charlottetown and Wednesday brought his mother in from Powal in the ambulance and placed her on the car, which left yesterday morning attached to the regular Borden train.

BOARD OF TRADE.—At a special meeting of the Summerside Board of Trade held last night, a communication from Mr. W. U. Appleton, General Manager of the C. N. R. (Atlantic Region) was read as follows: "Confirming our conversation in connection with additional train service between Summerside and Tignish, in order to take care of the Christmas trade, I have instructed our Superintendent of Transportation and Superintendent Grady to operate train number 211 out of Summerside effective the 15th and up to and including December 24th." The efforts of the Board of Trade are to be commended for this move which will give, during the time specified, two incoming trains from Tignish and two outgoing trains to Tignish.

SUPREME COURT.—At the sitting of the Supreme Court which ended in Summerside early this week, the case of Michael Perry vs. Henry Perry, an action of debt brought by the plaintiff for board of the defendant's wife, was settled in favor of the plaintiff who was awarded the sum of \$76. Mr. C. Saunders, K.C., for plaintiff, Messrs. H. Strong and W. Tanton for defendant. The case of Michael Griffin, appellant, vs. Cecil R. Palmer, respondent, was an appeal from a conviction by a Justice of the Peace for Deception for violation of the Dominion Fisheries Act. The appeal was allowed with costs and the conviction quashed. Messrs. Tanton and Strong for appellant, Messrs. Neil McLeod and Saunders for respondent.

ENGINE DERAILED.—A light engine sent out from Charlottetown yesterday morning for shunting at Borden, left the rails near Winsloe at 11:45 completely blocking the track. The train leaving Charlottetown at 3 p. m. was held up at the place of the accident as was also the early train from Borden. Passengers' mails and baggage from both trains were transferred from one to the other and reached their respective destinations with but little loss of time. An engine and cars were sent out from Charlottetown to meet the afternoon train from Borden when the latter's mails, passengers, baggage, etc., were transferred and arrived in Charlottetown at 8 o'clock.

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FOXES FOR NORWAY.—Among the shipments being sent out from Summerside this morning by Mr. John A. Lea is a collection of 15 pairs for Norway. These foxes were personally selected by Mr. Howard McKendrick, who has been in the fox business in Norway for 4 years and who is now visiting here. Every year for the past 2 or 3 years Mr. Lea has sent a number of foxes to Norway and the 15 pairs going this morning are being sent to a man who has secured the best Island stock from Mr. Lea on several previous occasions. They are a particularly good lot of Silver Blacks and will no doubt do much to advertise Summerside as the fox centre. Mr. Lea is also shipping 40 pairs to Michigan and several other small lots to Ontario and Quebec.
