A CIRCULAR has been issued to the members of the Methodist Church in the Charlottetown District of the New Brunswick and P. E. Island Conference. The following is an extract: "On the 14th day of next October there is to be inaugurated throughout the bounds of the General Conference, one of the most important movements ever devised and adopted in the history of the Methodist church. This movement to which all the Conference have pledged their warmest sympathy and heartiest support amounts to an aggressive, evangelistic campaign on every circuit and mission of the Methodist church from the Atlantic to the Pacific, and also in Newfoundland and Burauada. At all of the Financial meetings of the Districts of the Conference, President Steel, submitted the plan, and at the District meeting held on August 23rd, the greater part of the time was given to the prayerful consideration of this great movement. Upon that meeting there was abundantly poured out the blessing of God. One of the results of the discussion was the appointing of a committee to arrange for a District Convention sometime before the date fixed for the opening of the campaign. That committee met and decided to hold the Convention in the First Methodist Church. On Thursday, Oct. 4th, the afternoon meeting to begin at 2.30, the evening meeting at 7.30. The committee would especially urge upon all the official members of the churches the necessity of being present at these meetings particularly at the afternoon meeting, and would affectionately appeal to the Methodist people generally, to be in attendance at the Convention in as large numbers as possible. The convention is held very near to the time of the opening of this Evangelistic movement in order that pastors and officials and the general membership of the churches alike may go back to their respective circuits baptized afresh in the power of God and with the most resolute determination to carry this glorious enterprise to a successful issue."

These brave boys accompanied by twenty other provincial men were invalided home. Sergeant Hesson, who is a genial and whole souled fellow, in conversation with a Transcript reporter said he was glad to get back. He was pleased to go South Africa but he is more pleased to get back home. A report was current among the boys that Corp. F. W. Coombs was dead. The report has not been confirmed. Sergeant Hesson says that the Canadian boys did their duty like old time veterans. At Paardeberg they showed the stuff they were made of. Among the number was Private McDermott, of St. John, who accidentally strayed into Cronje's laager and was taken prisoner. Cronje's secretary wanted to shoot him but the General spared his life.—Moncton Transcript.
