Maple Leafs Beat Boston Bruins To Even Up Series

Charlie Sands, Leaf Rookie, Is Star As Toronto Team Wins Fourth Tilt 5 To 3—Final Game Tonight

TORONTO, April 2.—Hardest-fought championship duel in several seasons, the Boston Bruins-Toronto Maple Leaf series for the National Hockey League title became a sudden-death game affair today. Four of the five-game battle left them with two victories each. Finalists for the Stanley Cup will be decided in the fifth game Monday night.

First of the series to be decided without overtime, Toronto Maple Leafs hurried to 5-3 victory Saturday night in a thrill-packed game at the arena. The Bruins, who had won the first two games, were outplayed in a key-passing position by Charlie Sands, Port Arthur rookie, into stardom with a brilliant display that brought the ill-built youth two goals and placed him in the key-passing position.

Fleet Harvey Jackson packed a go-goal punch in the Leafs' victory at Charlie Conacher, his right wing mate, of the ace scoring line, accounted for the other Toronto marker. Pivoted by Bill Thoms, this line carried deadly menace for the Bruins' defense as the big right-winger flashed his best form of the season and Jackson was a consistent threat.

DETROIT LOSE SECOND TILT TO RANGERS

New York Squad Qualify For Cup Finals For Second Successive Year.

DETROIT, Mich., April 2.—Lester Patrick's New York Rangers tonight entered the Stanley Cup finals for the second year in succession when they defeated Detroit Red Wings 4-3 in the second of their two-game semi-final series and took the round 6-3. The winners will meet either Boston or Toronto at New York Tuesday night in the first of the five-game Stanley Cup final series.

Crashing body-checks halted Eddie Shore, spearhead of the Bruin power attack but Vic Ripley, Nels Stewart and Marty Barry ranged clear of blue and white-clad opponents long enough to register Boston's three goals. Stewart, burly pivot of Joe Lamb and Vic Ripley, took a heavy battering from the Toronto defense, but despite it, led the most dangerous attacking Boston line.

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SMOKE EATERS AND QUAKERS PLAY TONIGHT

Both Teams Are Confident Of Victory. It Will Be Trail's Fourth Allan Cup Semi-Final.

VANCOUVER, April 2.—Taking their hockey seriously and with a grim determination to give their best to advance to the final round of Allan Cup play, Western Canada's senior hockey finalists, Trail Smoke-Eaters and Saskatoon Quakers, rolled into town today and set about preparing for their two-game series which opens at the arena here tomorrow night.

Smoke-Eaters arrived shortly after noon, brimful of confidence and eager for the series in which they hope to make hockey history and bring to the Coast Province for the first time the Western Canada title and enter the final round for the coveted cup. It will be Trail's fourth Allan Cup semi-final.

Nova Scotian Figures In Golf Tourney

HALIFAX, April 3—(C.P.)—D'Arcy Ryan, engineer assigned to the task of illuminating Chicago for the Century of Progress Exposition next summer, is a native of Nova Scotia. He was born at Kentville and practised his profession in Halifax before moving to United States, where he has won a prominent place in electrical circles.

Under his direction a brilliant display has been planned for the world fair, including an aurora artificially produced, to illuminate Chicago all summer.

The aurora will be formed by an arch of searchlights, the beams of which will intersect directly above the pillar and spread out, fan-like, over the sky. The beams will not be visible until they intersect and form the aurora.

SHARKEY TO MEET CARNERA IN JUNE

Holder Of The World's Heavy-weight Title On Tour Of Canada May Visit Maritimes.

MONTREAL, April 2.—"The Carnera fight will be my only bout this year," champion Jack Sharkey stated tonight as he arrived here for his exhibition tomorrow which opens a Canadian tour. Sharkey, holder of the world's heavyweight crown, will meet Primo Carnera next June.

PUTNEY-ON-THAMES, England, April 2.—"Cambridge has won again."
Thousands of persons the world over, but more particularly in England, voiced that significant fact today for on the waters of the historic Thames, Cambridge yesterday afternoon won their 10th consecutive victory in the classic inter-Varsity boat race.

Several hundred thousand saw Oxford make a valiant attempt to regain the coveted honors of the "Battle of the Blues" which have eluded them for so long. A powerful octet of cantabs rowed with precision and smoothness that could not be denied, however, and the light blue Cambridge crew skimmed over the finishing line at Mortlake Brewery 2 1/4 lengths ahead.
